## Sheridan forum to debate region

The "definitive debate" on regional government in Peel is promised by Sheridan College officials at their Peel '74 public forum March 30 and 31.

Up to 500 area residents are expected to attend the two-day forum at the new Chinguacousy Civic Centre where 35 well known authorities under the chairmanship of professor Anthony Adamson will present their analyses.

The forum will be divided into eight mini-forums so citizens may choose a subject of interest and participate in the discussion.

Mrs. Killaby added that ratepayers associations and citizens groups have already held preliminary meetings and have ap-pointed delegates to Peel '74.


#### Truck by-pass may affect Mississauga

"This new idea has to be taken in the overall county planning context," Miller noted. "This could make Highway 410 redundant in
