PRINCIPAL DELEGATES.

Photograph of the Delegates. 1. MR. CHAMBERLAIN recalled that at the Opening
Plenary Session a photograph of the whole Conference
had been taken in Queen Anne's Room at St. James's
Palace. This had been a new departure for an
Imperial Conference. The usual thing in the past
had been for a photograph of the Delegates to be
taken in the garden at 10, Downing Street.

He had now been asked to ascertain whether

Delegates would agree to being photographed in a

group in the garden at 10, Downing Street, in addition
to the photograph already taken.

It was agreed that permission should be given to photograph the Delegates in the garden at 10, Downing Street. Monday, June 14th, would be a suitable date.

Imperial

2. The Meeting had before them a Note dated May 15th, 1937, by the Chairman of the Conference (at that time Mr. Baldwin) covering a Report on the Work of the Imperial War Graves Commission, 1917-1937.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN called the attention of the Meeting to the fact that His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, who was President of the Imperial War Graves Commission, had addressed to Mr. Baldwin as Chairman of the Conference a Memorandum covering this Report and inviting him to commend it to the notice of the Conference.

He (Mr. Chamberlain) had much pleasure in complying with His Royal Highness' invitation. He suggested that the Conference should record, in its published Report, its appreciation of the excellent work which the Commission had done and were continuing to do.

The draft of a passage for inclusion in the Report was handed round at this point. For this passage see Appendix I to the present Conclusions.
