

Telephone messages have been received from visitors wanting to speak to prisoners, but this has never been permitted.

To my knowledge Mrs Brooks and Miss Buchanan, known in the visitors Book, as visiting the Detention Barracks on the 1st and 9th April 1928, never visited the Detention Barracks whilst I was on duty there.

Prisoners have been allowed, on the authority of the Garrison Adjutant, to see visitors after 5 pm. I have known of visitors being permitted on days other than Sundays.

One prisoner is allowed - in certain hours - to be employed around the Detention Barracks - as kitchen help, furnace man, etc. He is out meal times and after 7 pm, he is, however, locked up in his cell.

The Warden on duty can use his discretion as to whether a ~~prisoner~~ ^{prisoner} can receive visitors on days other than Sundays.

Re-examined by Prosecutor:-

Instructions were given to me by Major Lawrence - the Garrison Adjutant at the time - to keep a record of visits to prisoners. I was given no details regarding the manner of making the entries.

Prisoners are locked-up in the cells for the night at 7 pm, & are only allowed out of the cells after that hour in the event of illness.
