heads, civil and criminal prosecutions, and unforeseen contingencies, have each year been voted, sufficient, in the opinion of this committee, to meet all exigencies under these heads.

Rep ort

Resolved,—That all accounts not regularly attested, claiming remuneration for services not provided for in any Bill of Supply, be not attended to.

Resolved,—That when a sum is voted in any Appropriation Bill, for any general or specific purpose, and that it has been found necessary to exceed that sum, sworn statements containing a detailed account of the expenditure, both of the sum voted and the amount due, be required previously to the taking into consideration the propriety of voting any such surplus expenditure.

And the said Resolutions having been read throughout a first and second time, were, upon the question put thereon, agreed to by the House.
