FROM OVER THE OCEAN

Russia Angry at England.

**THE KHALIFA'S CAPTURE IMMIN-
ENT—HOOLEY'S QUEER EVID-
ENCE—SIAM WAKING UP.**

Canea, Island of Crete, Nov. 8.—The
Turkish troops at Retimo, having re-
fused to leave that place, the Russian
admiral in those waters, following the
example of Admiral Noel, the British
commander here, forcibly conveyed
them on board a transport.

RATHER SARCASTIC.
Paris, Nov. 8.—The Gaulois a n-
nounces that henceforth the motto,
"God Protects France," will be stricken
from French coin. The paper re-
marks sarcastically that it is a good
thing, since foreigners might be led
to believe, from seeing the inscription,
that Frenchmen still have faith in
Providence. It suggests the govern-
ment adopt the motto, "Schwarz-
Koppen Protects the Republic."

ANGRY AT ENGLAND.
St. Petersburg, Nov. 8.—The St.
Petersburg newspapers show great ir-
ritation at England over the settlement
of the Fashoda affair, and agree in
declaring that her conduct will
arouse the powers interested in the
Suez Canal to open discussion of the
best means of preventing the final es-
tablishment of England in Egypt.
The Noeti says that since the Egyp-
tian question is purely of an interna-
tional character, it must be solved by
a congress of the powers, which can
proclaim the neutrality of Egypt un-
der the protectorate of all the powers.

THE KHALIFA'S CAPTURE.
Cairo, Nov. 8.—Khalifa Abdallah,
the defeated Dervish leader, is hard
pressed on the frontier of Kordofan,
south-west of Khartoum, by natives
friendly to the Russian government.
The Dervish is believed to be in a
critical position, and it is believed that his cap-
ture is imminent. All Sniff is al-
ready a prisoner and is being brought
to Khartoum.

CZAR'S BIG SCHEME.
St. Petersburg, Nov. 8.—After long
consideration of the project, it is re-
ported that the Russian government
is about to commence work on a
great ship canal from the Baltic to
the Black Sea. The estimated cost is
\$155,000,000, and the canal is to be com-
pleted in five years. In addition to its
commercial value, such a canal would
be of great worth to the government
in affording means of affecting junc-
tion in the Baltic and Black Sea fleets
independently of the Dardanelles
route. The disbursement of the
Czar Nicholas is believed to have been
made to blind the eyes of European
nations to the magnitude and impor-
tance of this canal scheme.

A PLOT IN PARIS.
London, Nov. 8.—The Daily Chronicle
this morning—"We have received
information from a reliable quarter
of a well-organized plot in Paris in
the event of the inquiry before the
Court of Cassation proving favorable
to Dreyfus, to foment a riotous out-
burst in the French capital, to attempt
to overthrow the civil power, and to
assassinate the leading champions of
Dreyfus. These reports are confirmed
by interviews had with M. Trarieux,
former minister of justice, and M. de
Presmeaux, foreign editor of the Temps,
as well as others. The police have
warned the friends of Dreyfus to
change their residences temporarily,
or at least to carry revolvers."

TRAINMEN OBJECT.

Americans Imported by the Wa-
bash Into Canada.

While Canadians are Being Laid off—
The Government was Appealed to
but is Doing Nothing.

Windsor correspondence Detroit Free
Press.—A number of the trainmen on
the Wabash Railway called on William
McGregor, Member of Parliament for
North Essex, yesterday, and complained
that they were not receiving justice at
the hands of the company. They told
him that many conductors, baggage-
men and brakemen had been imported
from the United States last spring and
given situations on passenger trains
running between Windsor and Fort
Erie, and although a complaint had
been made to the Government at the
time no action was taken. The Wind-
sor trainmen had decided to allow the
matter to drop, as they were all making
good time, but an order was received
from the company last week which has
urged them to renewed action. This
order was to the effect that on and
after November 13, two passenger trains
would be taken off from the Windsor-
Fort Erie run during the winter
months. This will cause a number of
men to be laid off, and already several
Windsor trainmen have received notice
that they will be set back to freight
braking or be put on the list as spare
men. They say that it is not fair to
them for the company to retain the men
who were imported to take their place,
while older men, Canadians, have
to take inferior places. As the men
complained against have now been re-
sidents of Canada for the past six months,
they cannot be deported under the
Canadian alien labor law.
