SUNDAY SERVICE

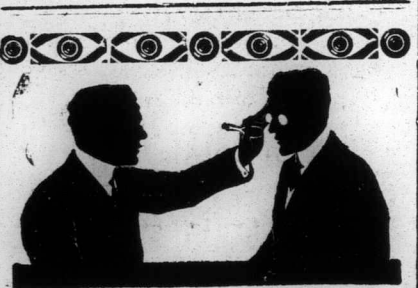
