TAX CANADIANS ENTERING U.S.

All Intending to Take up **Residence There Must**

OTHERS ARE EXEMPT Upon Proving Their Stay

Only Temporary By Courier Leased Wire. Ottawa, Ont. March 29.-Some

nisunderstanding seems to exist as gards the proposed head tax on Canadians entering the United States. It is not a Canadian, but an American regulation. Heretofore foreigners entering the United States xcepting Canadians, have been subiect to a head tax of \$4. There has been no tax on Canadians or any person who had resided a year or more in this country. Under the new American regulations to take effect May 1, the head tax is increased to be applied to Canadians entering the United States for residence. Authorities here are in doubt as to the exact effect of the regulations, but it is understood Canadians visit-ing the United States may obtain identification cards, otherwise they may have to pay the head tax, which crowd of shoppers.
