Some subscribers on above list will notice their date is not paid in advance or perhaps not up to 1916. The reason is that our terms are strictly \$1.50 if not paid in advance. Subscribers in arrears who remit only \$1.00 will get credit for only 8 months, but by remitting at once sufficient to pay in advance to 1917 a full year will be allowed for each dollar paid. Persons stopping the paper are thus obliged to pay the regular price of \$1.50 per year.

The amount of assigned pay for separation allowance now being sent out monthly by the Militia Department to dependents or relatives of the men at the front totals about \$2,000,000. There are some 90,000 names on the list of recipients. The total monthly pay roll of the department is now something like \$6,000,000. Consequently about one-third of the pay earned by the men on active service is assigned to the kin they left behind them.
