Macgillivray for plaintiff, Hon. C. F. McLean for defendant, John A. Stewart vs. James Scott, action on a contract; the defendant obtained amendment of defence on payment of costs of application and costs of term; A. Macgillivray for plaintiff, D. H. McKinnon and Ernest Gregory for defendant. Court adjourned at 10.30 yesterday sine die.

### General News.

Another revolution has broken out in Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil.  
The Hon. Mr. Daly, the new Minister of the Interior, has been re-elected by acclamation.  
Osman Digma, reported dead several times, has reappeared in the Sudan with a number of followers, and has occupied Sinkat.  
Election returns for Italian Chamber of Deputies show 184 Government supporters and 71 members of the opposition elected.  
A strike which may be the first of a series began on Monday among the weavers in the Tremont and Suffolk cotton mills, in Lowell, Mass.  
The steamer "Halifax" and "Carroll" encountered a blinding snow-storm last Saturday off the American coast, on their return trip from Boston.  
The U. S. State Department has received notice that the Gilbert Islands in the Southern Pacific has been placed under the protection of Great Britain.  
Last week people in Pennsylvania were paying \$1 a barrel for water for domestic use, owing to the fierce drought that had prevailed for many weeks there.  
The inventory of the estate of the late Daniel Cronin, of Halifax, was filed on the 26th ult. It shows that he was worth \$719,968 at the time of his death.  
La grippe has begun operations once more in New York. It is said to be accompanied with other complications which make it more dangerous than it was before.  
Fourteen inches of snow on the I. C. R. at River de Loup made the use of snow-ploughs necessary last Monday. They have never before been brought out so early.  
Up to Oct. 31st, over 500,000 tons of coal has reached the port of Montreal from the Cape Breton mines since the opening of navigation in the spring. The increase over last year was nearly 50,000 tons.  
The new German military bill will, if passed, enable Germany, in the course of a few years, to bring to the field a trained army of 4,400,000 men. Her trained soldiers are at present outnumbered by those of France.  
Dr. Bournot has been officially notified from Paris that the late M. Xavier Mariner, the distinguished traveller and litterateur, and member of the French Academy, has left by his will a valuable collection of books to the Royal Society of Canada.  
The British warship Howe grounded on the Perito reef on the Coast of Spain, last week, and in spite of all efforts to save her became a wreck. The Howe was a battleship of the admiral class, had a displacement of 10,300 tons, and carried 10 guns.  
Hon. Messrs. Longly and Johnson have made a formal demand upon the Dominion government for a refund of \$2,000,000 which the Local government is said to have expended upon certain railroad lines in this province which now form a portion of the I. C. R. and belong to the Dominion.  
On the morning of the 2nd, an express train from Edinburgh, the Flying Scotchman, crashed into a freight train near Thirsk, Yorkshire, causing a terrible fog. Ten persons were killed and twelve wounded. To add to the horrors of the scene, several cars caught fire, and some of the dead bodies were found to be burned out of all semblance to humanity when taken out of the debris.  
Last Friday the British Government, issued an order prohibiting the importation of Canadian stocker cattle into the British Isles, on account of the alleged prevalence of pleuro-pneumonia among them. The order comes into force on the 21st inst. Shippers in Ontario and Quebec who have petitioned the Canadian government to use its influence to have the order so amended as to allow the entry of cattle leaving this side before that date. Good authorities maintain that there is actually no pleuro pneumonia among cattle on the Canadian side of the line.  
The trial of Mercier and Pacaud ended last Friday in a verdict of "not guilty." Although Judge Wurtelle had charged strongly against the accused, the jury did not take ten minutes to decide that the charges had been proven. The verdict was received with great rejoicing by Mercier's friends. The fallen leader has since received quite an ovation in Montreal, and delivered an oration in which he declared his intention of leading a crusade next session in the local legislature against the rights of the Catholic minorities in Manitoba.  
There is widespread distress in England this fall, and trouble is feared unless the government have recourse to public relief measures, for the benefits of those who have been thrown out of employment. The great Lancashire cotton-loom began on Saturday. Mills containing 15,000,000 spindles and employing about 50,000 hands closed their doors at 1 o'clock to remain idle until the question of wages is settled. Other mills in the federation will also close as soon as they have filled existing orders. There will then be at least 60,000 mill hands deprived of the means of providing bread for themselves and their families.  
A San Francisco despatch of Nov. 6th says: The steam whaler Beluga, which arrived from the Arctic to day, brings news of the destruction of the whaling boat Helen Mar, and the loss of 36 of her crew. Only five of the vessel's men were saved. On October 6th while the Helen Mar was engaged in cutting in a whale, she crashed in the ice. The vessel and boats were crushed to splinters. The officers and men had no time to lower a boat and get away. The five who were saved clung to the mainmast as it went over the ice. For 48 hours they clung to the mast and were finally taken off by the steam whaler Osea.

Rev. Father MacIntosh is about to have our church heated with hot water.  
Up to the present the fall business of this town has been exceedingly dull. The decline in sailing vessel trade is affecting this port seriously.
