Lloydminster, Sask., July 16.—A body of a man was found floating in the Saskatchewan river north of here so badly decomposed as to be unrecognizable. It was dressed in a bathing suit, was five feet four inches tall, weight about one hundred and sixty pounds, age uncertain. It was believed to have floated from Edmonton or some other town west. The police are investigating. The body is believed to be that of one of the two men recently drowned at Edmondton.

QUEBEC PAGEANT

The Order of Events at the Old City—What Takes Place Each Day—The Procession and the Scenes.

The official program of the Quebec Tercentenary celebration, which has just been issued, is as follows, with order of the procession and scenes of historic pageants on the Plains:

Thursday, July 16—Arrival of the advance British fleet of six men-of-war.

Sunday, July 19—"L'Association Catholique de la Jeunesse Canadienne Francaise" will do honor to the memory of Champlain at the foot of his statue, in the afternoon.

Monday, July 20—Mounted heralds-at-arms and men of the watch will appear in the streets, costumed as in the time of Champlain. The heralds will proceed through the city, stopping at all important places and will make official announcements in connection with the celebration, the arrival of official guests, the program of the following day. Evening—The congress of the French speaking physicians of North America will open.

Tuesday, July 21—Arrival and reception of official guests, and of the French and American fleets.

Afternoon—Performance of the Pageant on the Plains of Abraham.

Evening—Concert in the drill hall, and performance of Pelicien David's symphonic ode, "Christophe Colomb."

Wednesday, July 22—H.R.H. the Prince of Wales will arrive in the afternoon escorted by a naval squadron, and will land at King's wharf.

Evening—Military bands at Dufferin Terrace, Victoria park and Boulevard Langeher. Special meeting of the Royal Society of Canada in honor of Champlain. Second performance of the symphonic ode, "Christophe Colomb."

Thursday, July 23—3 p.m. arrival of Champlain on his ship the "Don de Dieu." At 4 o'clock presentation of the civic address of welcome to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, and other official ceremonies commemorative of Champlain and the founding of Quebec. Review of the historic procession in front of the Champlain monument.

Evening—Illumination of the combined fleets and of the surrounding country and a great display of fireworks on the Heights of Levis, opposite the city.

Friday, July 24—Morning, review on the Plains of Abraham before H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, and dedication of the Quebec battlefields.

Afternoon—Performance of the Pageant on the Plains.

Evening—Official ball at the Parliament house, given by the government of the province of Quebec.

Saturday, July 25—Afternoon—State performance of the Pageant on the Plains. Lacrosse match on the Q.A.A.A. grounds by two championship teams.

Evening—Band, concerts on the Terrace in the Victoria Park and at the Boulevard Langeher. Concert de gala at the drill hall.

Sunday, July 26—"Messe Solennelle," on the Plains of Abraham. Service at the English Cathedral at which H.R.H. the Prince of Wales will be present.

Monday, July 27—Afternoon—Regatta in the harbor in front of the city. Performance of the Pageant on the Plains.

Evening—Naval display at night by the ships of the fleets in the port of Quebec.

Tuesday, July 28—Morning—H. R. H. the Prince of Wales will visit Victoria park and plant a tree in commemoration of his visit.

Afternoon—Children's fete and day fireworks on the Plains. Naval and military gymnastics.

Reception of his honor and Lady Jette at Spencerwood.

Evening—Historical costume ball at parkham house.

Wednesday, July 29—Departure of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales.

Afternoon—Performance of the Pageant on the Plains. Children's fete and day fireworks at Victoria park.

Evening—Civic reception at the city hall.

Thursday, July 30—Parade of the National societies, and Canadian and other clubs and associations, as well as independent military bands, both Canadian and foreign.

Evening—Great display of fireworks at Victoria park.

Friday, July 31—Last performance on the Plains.

ORDER OF PROCESSION

Order of the historical procession through the streets on Thursday, July 23:

1. The men of the watch and heralds at arms.
2. Jacques Cartier, accompanied by 110 sailors, preceded by a cross with the arms of France.
3. Francis I., King of France, and his court.
4. DeMonts, Champlain, Pontgrave, the three chiefs of the expedition, followed by the crew of the Don de Dieu.
5. Henry IV., Sully and the court of France.
6. Dollard and his sixteen French comrades at Long Sault.
7. Discoverers and founders of the towns of Joliet, LaSalle, Maisonneuve, etc.

8. Cavalcade, representing De Tracy, with his suite composed of 24 guards and four sailors of the Regiment of Carignan-Salieres.

9. Duluth and the couriers de bois.

10. Frontenac, with the sovereign council, and his guards and gendarmes, and the militia men of Robineau de Beaucourt, of Ivesville and other chiefs.

11. Mlle. de Vercheres, accompanied by brothers and followers and groups of Indians.

12. Montcalm and Levis at the head of their regiments, the LaSarre, Languedoc, Bearn, Guine, Royal Rousillon, Berry, Marine troops, Canadian militia and Indian allies.

13. Wolfe and Murray and their regiments, Amherst's, Anstruther's, LaCelle's, Kennedy's, Bragg's, Ottawa's, Louisbourg Grenadiers, Scotch Highlanders, and Royal American.

14. Guy Carleton and the principal officers of the regular troops and the Canadian militia, defenders of Quebec, 1775.

15. De Salaberry and his 300 Voltigeurs de Chateaugay.

N.B.—At the head of each group, pages will walk with banners giving date and short description of group.

SCENES

(All of which are produced at each performance.)

1595—Scene I. The village of Steadacosta. Indian festivities; Jacques Cartier plants a cross on the bank of the river. Scene 2. The gardens of Fontainebleau. Jacques Cartier at the court of Francis I.

Second Pageant

1608—Scene I. The Louvre. Champlain receives his commission from Henry IV.

1620—Scene 2. Madame de Champlain comes to Quebec.

Third Pageant

1639—Arrival of the Hospitaliers and Ursuline Nuns; they are welcomed by the governor, Hault de Montigny, Knight of Malta, Mother Mary of the Incarnation and the Indian children.

Fourth Pageant

1660—Dollard des Ormeaux and his companions at arms at the Long Sault. Battle with the Iroquois.

Fifth Pageant

1665—Mgr. de Laval ceremonially receives M. de Tracy, lieutenant-governor of Louis XIV.

Sixth Pageant

1670—Daumont de Saint Lussion takes possession of the western country in the name of the king of France.

Seventh Pageant

1690—Frontenac receiving the message of Sir William Phips at the Chateau St. Louis.

Eighth Pageant

1759 and 1760—Montcalm and Levis Wolfe and Murray, with their respective regiments in a parade of honor, marching and counter marching on the Plains. General salute of the troops answered by the guns of the warships. Grouping of all the historical characters of the possession and the pageants.

Grand Finale

Performance of pageants will take place on July 24, 25, 27, 29, and 31, from 5 to 7 p.m.
