NEW TRIAL FOR OUTLAWS.

Unusual Course in B. C.—Grounds Up-

on Which Appeal is Made.

Victoria, B. C., June 25.—Edwards

(C.B. Miller), Dunn and Coughoun,

the three outlaws convicted of the

hold-up of the C. P. R. train and sen-

tenced to life and 25 years terms in the

penitentiary, are making strenuous ef-

forts through their counsel, Mr. Mac-

Intyre, to secure a new trial.

This is unusual in criminal matters

in British Columbia, where in 90 cases

out of 100, a conviction is accepted as

final disposing of the matter in is-

suance.

The prisoners' counsel, in presenting

his application to Mr. Justice Irving,

urged two points—that the prisoners

were not asked to plead at their sec-

ond trial, and that counsel for the

Crown had referred to the identifica-

tion of a belt by one of the prisoners,

no evidence being offered in this regard

upon which such comment would pro-

perly rest.

The lordship held that there had been

no point ruled upon at the trial which

was unfair to the prisoners, and refus-

ed to grant a case stated.

Mr. MacIntyre will now appeal from

this ruling to the full court at its

autumnal session.

STATE DINNER.

Municipal Honors Paid to King Haakon

at Trondhjem.

Trondhjem, June 25.—A state dinner

and ball were given last night by the

municipality of Trondhjem, in honor of

the King and Queen and foreign

princes.

There were present members of the

diplomatic corps and a brilliant assem-

blage of 900 persons.

King Haakon's First Leave.

Trondhjem, Norway, June 25.—King

Haakon and Queen Maud Saturday

left their first leave, commencing at 11

o'clock in the morning, and the palace

was again the town's centre of in-

terest. All the special embassies,

statesmen, officials and other prom-

ROYAL COUPLE IN DANGER.

Spaniard Tries to Intercept King Al-

fonsso and Queen Victoria.

Lagranja, Spain, June 25.—At the

moment when the royal automobile,

containing King Alfonso and Queen

Victoria arrived here from the theatre

Friday night, a well-dressed individual

evaded the guards and sought to in-

tercept the royal couple. He was arrested

and gave the name of Joz Maria of

Madrid.

When searched papers of a suspi-

cious nature and considerable money

were found upon him.

An Italian who was acting in a

strange manner was also arrested. He

claimed that he was on his way to

Bilbao, looking for work.

KILLS SELF WITH SHOTGUN.

Young Scotchman, Two Months in To-

ronto, Ends His Life.

Toronto, June 25.—Donald McCallum,

who arrived from Scotland two months

ago, committed suicide Saturday morn-

ing at his boarding house, 825 West

King street. He was 26 years of age

and employed as a laborer in the city

yards. He committed the deed with a

shotgun. Mrs. Kinsella, the landlady,

heard the report of the gun at 6.15.

The door of McCallum's room was

forced open and he was found dead. As

far as was known he had no relatives

in this country.

TOOK ANT POISON IN ERROR.

Woman Visitor to St. Catharines Wed-

ding Makes Fatal Mistake.

St. Catharines, June 25.—Mrs. Mc-

Kenzie, a woman of 55 years of age,

who came here from Gananoque, where

she resided, a week ago to attend the

wedding of her niece, Miss Northrup,

on Thursday last, on the same day

took a dose of tartar emetic, mistak-

ing it for shelled salts. She died Sat-

urday morning.

Tartar emetic resembles salts in ap-

pearance. It is used for destroying

ants.

To Wipe Pensions Out.

Ottawa, June 25.—(Globe Special.)

This week the Government will in-

troduce legislation regarding pensions to

ex-Cabinet Ministers. It has been gen-

erally accepted that the pensioning

of the English system under which a

pension was granted upon application

would be adopted. Now, however, there

is a disposition in some quarters to

believe the bill will be repealed altogeth-

er. Official confirmation is lacking, but

should it prove to be correct, hearty ap-

proval will be forthcoming from all

quarters.

vators "A" and "B," owned by George

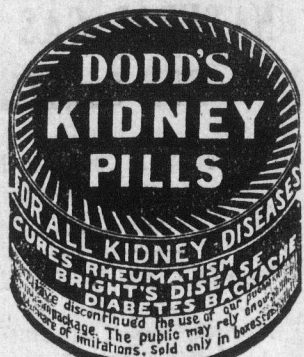
A. Seaverns and occupied by J. S.
