Britain's War Secretary.

The Right Hon. Richard Burton Haldane, Secretary of State for War in the British Liberal Cabinet, is not a warrior nor a military man, but a successful lawyer and a distinguished philosopher. His appointment to his present position tempted a well-known German statesman to make some caustic remarks about the peculiar doings of the English people. Mr. Haldane was born at Edinburgh University and at Goettingen. His favorite study was philosophy, and in this he so excelled at both seats of learning that in 1876 he was appointed Gray and Ferguson scholar in philosophy at the four Scottish universities. In 1879 he was called to the Bar and was made a Q.C. in 1890. This year he was elected Lord Rector of Edinburgh University. Mr. Coatsworth's plurality, 5,519.

London, Jan. 2.—Hon. Adam Beck received the news of the result of Teronto's vote upon the Nisgars Power bylaw at "Hedley," his home in London. The Minister of Power was naturally pleased at the outcome.

"It is apparent." Mr. Beck said to a reporter, "that the policy of the Government in dealing with the waterpower privileges of the province has been endorsed in a very handsome manner. I believe the people of Toronto have acted wisely, and that the future will fully demonstrate this."

"Was the majority larger than you had anticipated?"

"It was certainly gratifying. The bylaw has received a most emphatic endorsation. This would be so in any event where so heavy a vote has been polled in favor of the proposition as laid down, but it is particularly the fact in view of the strong efforts that were put forward to defeat the bylaw. The Effect.

"What do you anticipate the effect of the vote in Toronto will be upon the municipalities which are yet to vote upon the question?"

"It will have a very favorable effect, undoubtedly. It is a mistaken impression that has gone abroad, however, that the western municipalities depended upon the outcome of the vote in Toronto. Toronto had a separate estimate. So had Hamilton and Dundas. Neither of these were contingent one upon the other. Had Toronto refused to accept Niagara power we would still be in a position to carry into effect our proposition with London, St. Thomas, Woodstock, Berlin, Stratford and all other places in this district. Toronto will obtain Niagara power at the figures we have submitted to the city, regardless of how Hamilton may vote."

"What do you consider would be the effect upon the municipalities other than Toronto, should they decline to accept Niagara power?"

"They would certainly be placed at a serious disadvantage in industrial development."
