THE LAST LINK OF "OLD" ACADIA GONE.—On Sunday evening last, while the people of Wolfville were on their way home from church, an alarm was given that the Academy Boarding House, generally known as the "Old Sem," was on fire.

A large number of persons at once repaired to the scene of the conflagration, but were unable to do more than save some of the contents of the burning building. The fire originated in the attic in the south west corner, and was first observed by some of the boarders in Chipman Hall. The night was fortunately very still and the other buildings were thus in very little danger. Every precaution was taken, however, and a force of men with buckets and water was stationed on the Seminary, but as the flying embers made no lodgment their services were not needed. The fire was first seen about 8 o'clock and at 11 the building was totally consumed. Only five persons, including housekeeper and two teachers, were in the building at the time of the fire, a large number of the students having removed to lodgings in the village a few days before. The building was insured for \$2,500. This building was built about 1831 and formed the nucleus of Acadia College. It was first used as an academy and afterwards as a ladies' seminary, but since the completion of the new seminary has been used as a boarding-house for male academy students.
