Women Wage-Earners in Ontario. Our sisters in Ontario are to be congratulated that during the last session of their Provincial Legislature amendments to law affecting the interests of women wage-earners were secured through their efforts.

Four years ago an act for the protection of this class was passed in response to an appeal from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Ontario.

Resolved—That we respectfully and earnestly request, in the name of thousands of women and girls, that the Factory Act be so amended as to extend its methods of inspection to mercantile houses.

We further call the attention of the Government to the increasingly large proportion of women workers employed in factories and mercantile houses. To our knowledge, many conditions inimical to health and morality exist; such evils are not, and could not, in the nature of things, be well made known to male inspectors.
