THE COMING ELECTION

Men and women of Canada are called to vote for members of a new parlament on Dec. 6. It has been a long time since the people of this big constituency has been privileged to vote in a general election-the last time being just ten years ago. In 1917 Hon. F. B. Carvell was elected by acclamation. Two years ago, when Mr. Carvell resigned his seat, T. W. Caldwell, the United Farmer candidate, was elected by a huge majority over Col. W. W. Premier Meighen has announced that the big issue in this election is the tariff. By such a declaration it is generally understood that if the mandate of the people he will proceed to remodel the tariff on lines that will give the manufacturers and big corporations a greater measure of protection than even the present high and oppressive pariff affords them. The common people will be the ones who will pay. On the other hand the Progressives are bound to tariff re duction and the admission duty free of many of the items needed particularly by farmers and the laboring classes inese are the principle planks in the platforms of the two parties that in this election are appealing for support in this constituency.
