The woes of the oppressed laborer get no space at all in the columns of the great newspapers here. But nevertheless, the thorough discussion in the house of lords of the horrible "sweating" system has been among the most important events of the week. The peers slitting on sumptuous couches in their gilded chamber have had a vivid oratorical panorams of the misery of the millions who toll for bread. It has been a perfect revelation to them. The London workingmen and girls and women who slave from morn till night at the needle, have no stand-champion to let the jublic know what they are suffering and to protect them from the mercliess monopolists. When any meeting of "sweaters" is held in the slums of the East End to give public utterance to their grievances, the newappers ignore it.

The life of the "sweaters" in London is very much like the life of the tenement house toilers in New York, only worse. "Sweating" dens are set up anywhere by greedy contractors. The working people are herded in them like cattle in stock yards, and the government inspection is made impossible. It would require an army of inspectors to enforce efficiently the provisions of the law, and even if the inspectors were quadrupled, so wretched is the condition of the workers that in many cases they themselves would aid the taskmasters in evading the official efforts at discovery and detection. The "sweaters" are practically slaves—glad of the opportunity to toil seventeen hours a day for a mere subsistence. Many of them are out of work nine months of the year.—London Cor. New York World.


