TWO BOERS SHOT.

Burgers Court Martialled This Morning for Breaking Their Parole and Wounding Policeman

STRICT MEASURES NECESSARY.

FREDERICTON, June 12.—Two Dutchmen named Venter and Krause were shot this morning for breaking their parole and attempting to escape from Fredericton and for shooting at and wounding a policeman. A companion, who was unarmed, was made prisoner. Severe military punishment is necessary in cases of this kind in order to discourage further breaches of neutrality. These three, with a companion, had surrendered and taken the oath of neutrality. They escaped Sunday and endeavored to gain their commands, but were recaptured and court martialled and sentenced as above.

AMERICAN LOCOMOTIVES.

An American Railroad Manager Takes Exception to Criticisms

Recently Made in England on the American Product.

The Machine Sold in Europe Is Not the Engine Used in America.

NEW YORK, June 12.—"They have no real American locomotive abroad," strictly speaking and the criticism of these English are from persons who do not know what they are," said A. M. Waitt, superintendent of motive power and rolling stock for the New York Central railroad system. He was speaking of the called reports of the unfavorable criticism passed by foreign railroad officials, upon the American made locomotives with which they have lately been experimenting. "The locomotives," Mr. Waitt continued, "are American in make, true enough, but they are English and foreign in dimensions, calibre and power, owing to other restrictions made necessary by narrow and lower tunnels and other essential differences which characterize English roads as compared with others, and the same is true I understand on the continent. It is simply impossible for them to utilize such a machine as we now regard as a truly American locomotive. The result is they get a sort of hybrid affair, built by American skill but on foreign lines, and to meet foreign requirements. And then if it does not prove to be all that they had hoped for they proceed to criticize the American locomotives."

SMALLPOX IN CONVENT.

Pupils at a Montreal School Quarantined Just as Holidays Approach.

MONTREAL, June 12.—Several cases of smallpox have broken out in the LaVallée Convent and the institution is quarantined. There are 60 pupils this school up, with the summer holidays to commence in two weeks.

NEARING THE END.

Mr. Hardy's Work on Earth Will Soon Be Finished.

TORONTO, June 12.—Hon. Mr. Hardy's condition at 1 o'clock was not so favorable as earlier, his pulse being very weak and his strength much less. The physician report him to be steadily sinking.

INSTANTLY KILLED.

A Old Man Employed on the L. C. R. Lost His Life.

NEW GLASGOW, June 12.—Hector Murray, aged 75, an old L. C. R. employee, was instantly killed this morning while repairing a car, which was suddenly struck by a shunter.

KILLED AT MONTREAL.

A Workman on McGill Building Struck by Falling Stone.

MONTREAL, June 12.—James Kirby, employed on construction work at the new McGill medical building, was killed this morning by a large piece of stone falling on him from a derrick.

INDIANS KILLED.

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 12.—A report reached here that three Indians have been killed in the mountains near Holbrook, in northern Arizona, by cowboys. The Indians were discovered stealing cattle.

HONOR THE BRAVE.

King Edward Presented Medals to Heroes of South Africa.

Lord Roberts, General Buller and other Generals Honored.

Brilliant Spectacle Participated in by Many Thousands.

LONDON, June 12.—London seldom had a finer spectacle than was witnessed on the Horse Guards parade this morning when King Edward presented medals to three thousand soldiers who participated in the South African campaign. The great square was lined with Guards drawn from the various regiments. In the centre of the group was a purple covered dais surrounded by an Indian text with silver corner poles. In the space between the dais and St. James Park were three thousand officers and men of the Guards, Household Cavalry and City Imperial Volunteers. All of them had served in the campaign. The Afrilders Horse Guards and other official buildings fronting the parade were decorated with flags. The Lord Mayor, Frank Green, attended in state and the members of the special Moonish Embassy in picturesque costumes were interested spectators. Promptly at 11 o'clock the King, in a Field Marshal uniform, the Queen, Princess Victoria and other members of the Royal family arrived and took up places on the dais and the ceremony began. The recipients of the medals in long line marched past the King and received the decorations from his Majesty, saluted and passed on. Lord Roberts came first, followed by Lord Milner, while beside them came crowds of Generals and lower officers whose names have become familiar owing to the war—Buller, Ian Hamilton and hosts of others. The ceremony lasted nearly three hours, the queen standing beside the King throughout.

CENSUS RETURNS.

Commissioner Blue Says the Published Returns Are Not at All Reliable.

OTTAWA, June 12.—Archibald Blue, Chief Census Commissioner, ridicules the published statement of the census in the eastern provinces. There is only one district tabulated so far, and that shows an increase of three thousand. They have not all the returns in yet.

ACCIDENT TO STEAMER.

HALIFAX, June 12.—The first officer of the steamer Border Knight and two of her crew landed at Shute Harbour last night. The men said they left the steamer fifteen days ago to bring intelligence that the steamer's shaft was broken and that she was short of coal and provisions. The Border Knight was bound from Cape de Verde for New York.

Presentation to Rev. Fr. Murphy. Rev. Fr. Murphy left upon the C. P. R. express this afternoon for his new charge at Dolbeau. A large number of his friends were at the station to say good bye and just before the departure of the train Fr. Murphy was presented by the congregation of St. Phileas with a purse of \$100.
