Need of Technical Training.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Mrs. Brown's address in the News of recent issue on the education of girls no doubt impressed many. What Mrs. Brown says is doubtless true, but are not our boys in a similar position? Many on leaving school have not the slightest knowledge of any trade or profession, and consequently have to take inferior positions in business life, owing to lack of proper training. I am not finding fault with our schools and colleges, but with the conditions that exist for the proper training of our young men in the various trades and professions.

What we need to-day is the trained man. A large majority of commercial enterprises, and almost every other undertaking depends entirely for its success on the genius of the technically trained man. Where is Newfoundland to-day? Our colleges are turning out scores of men annually but many of them are without any special training, simply because they cannot afford to go to a University. What we want in Newfoundland are trade schools and technical institutes where our young men can get a theoretical as well as the practical part of the various professions and trades.

Newfoundland is a country rich in minerals, timber and soils, and when new ideas are brought forward and mines opened up, and new businesses started we have to go to other countries in search of men.

I venture to say, Mr. Editor, that we have as good a talent around the outports and in the city as can be found anywhere, but it has never had an opportunity to develop itself.

If the men who cannot attend a University were trained in the country, would not be better off than we are to-day?

It is time the Government woke up and seen that these needs were remedied, and that Newfoundland was as she ought to be.

Lord Furness Passed Away

Yesterday, Hon. Jas. Pitts, and Mr. Montgomery, Manager of the Furness Line here, had telegrams embodying news of the death of Lord Furness, of Grandley, a prominent personage in the United Kingdom, a man of world-wide fame, and one of the shipping magnates of Great Britain. Lord Furness was born in 1852, at West Hartlepool and represented his native city in Parliament in the Liberal interests for 15 years. He was knighted in 1895, and was elected to the Peerage in 1910. Sir Christopher Furness, as he is popularly known, was head of the firm of Furness Withy & Co., and of the Furness Line of Steamships, and was also famed as a ship and engine builder. He was also one of the largest land owners in the Old Country, and his son Marquiduke succeeds him in the peerage.

New York Owes More Than Nation—Statistics Prove It's Busy Little Town.

New York, Nov. 3.—New York has become a billion dollar city, according to data made public by the Merchants' Association to-day.

The municipal debt is now \$1,037,000,000. This, according to the asso-

ciation's figures, is several millions more than the National debt. Father Knickerbocker owes more than five times as much as Philadelphia, Chicago and Boston combined.

In New York there is a new building every 50 minutes, a new business corporation every 40 minutes; the stock brings a New Yorker every six minutes. There are 26,000 manufacturers who make \$2,000,000,000 of goods a year. The greater city has 85,000 acres of vacant land also.
