Socialist Leader for Front.

Leonida Bissolati Gets Enthusiastic Send-off From All Sorts of People.
Udine, Italy, via Paris, June 1.—Leonida Bissolati-Bergamaschi, the eminent leader in the chamber of deputies of the Reform Socialists, dressed in the uniform of a sergeant of the Alpine regiment, arrived here to-day with his company.

Sergt. Bissolati attempted to leave the station without attracting attention, but a group of Bersaglieri saw him and shouted "Viva Bissolati!"

The deputy then tried to make his escape but he was soon surrounded by a crowd of officers, soldiers and young and old men, and girls and women, who cheered him vociferously. The deputy finally took refuge in a cafe, where an old man tottered up to him and said in a trembling voice: "God bless you. Hold what opinion you please since you are ready to go forward when your country calls you."

A priest who was going to the front as a lieutenant asked Sergt. Bissolati to write a line in his note book. Bissolati complied with the words: "Greeting to the Christian priest who is fighting for civilization."

To another priest, a chaplain, Bissolati said: "At the front you will dispense comfort to the wounded, but also (pointing to the chaplain's revolver) dispense some of those pills among the Austrians."

Marriage in Other Lands.

If there were no war in Russia, this season would see the beginning of many a happy wedding there.

The Russian peasant always marries young, and so probably is very much in the mood for all the Jollifications attendant on his wedding.

The night before the ceremony, if it is at all possible, a dance is given which lasts all night, and on the actual day of the marriage, the bridegroom and his friends walk about the village playing music on instruments, and throwing sugar to the children.

In sunny Spain etiquette is so very restrictive in the matter of courtship, and it is so difficult for young people to get to know one another, that one wonders how they ever manage to get married at all. Even when, after many difficulties, the engagement is accomplished, the parents have a deciding voice in fixing the date, and, as they prefer long engagements, the wedding-day is usually fixed somewhere in the dim future.

The best man and maid of honour are expected not only to fulfil the usual duties, but to contribute—sometimes very substantially—to the expenses of the wedding-feast. Wedding-cake is unknown, but instead packets of sugared almonds are distributed among the guests and sent by post to those who are unable to be present.

A Norwegian wedding is a delightful spectacle. The picturesque Norwegian national costume is worn, and the wedding-party—in pretty carriages or on foot—walks or drives in procession to the church. After the ceremony there is a dance on the village green, with a violin for accompaniment, till it is time for supper. The next day the festivities are resumed, and possibly they may extend to the day after.
