

Harbor Grace Notes.

As society from your correspond-
ing to get being on the job, so to
speak within the last week or so, we
are hardly necessary, seeing
that the first time we have had a
snow from the city since Saturday.
The very heavy storm
of the last week, which lasted for
three days, was the heaviest seen here
in many years, and the old stand-
ards say that the snow banks were
higher in their experience;
the streets, as well as other places,
were in a pretty bad state, the drifts
being in some of the houses
Monday seemed to be the worst
of the three days, and business in
the city was practically suspended.
The snow was so deep that
nearly anyone could get about. The
snow from Carbonar on route to the
city, spent almost two days at the
junction, where the snow for quite
a distance was 15 and 20 feet deep.
At this time, no doubt, she has
reached the city. The one arriving
from St. John's this afternoon, was
a welcome visitor; she brought
large mail with her. We were be-
lieving to feel that our capital was
in some remote part of the world,
that we were isolated somewhat.

The storm of Friday of the previ-
ous week was left here pretty much
as it was, and so the snow for the day

In account of the change of wind,
the snow broke up, as far as the
port of St. John's, and drifted out the
bay. The upper part of the harbor

sent the shareholders.

It is ordered that Henry J. Crowe
be appointed to represent sharehold-
ers and that the matter be referred
to the Registrar to take evidence and
report as to the services rendered and
what (if any) remuneration is payable
to the liquidators.
