

Harbor Grace Notes.

As a sequel from your correspondent being on the job, so to speak, within the last week or so, we have had a very heavy storm on the 18th inst., which lasted for many days, and the old standing record for snow banks were broken in their experience; higher in some places than in others, as well as other places, in a street, as well as in the houses, and in some of the houses, the snow seemed to be the worst in three days, and business in town was practically suspended. Schr. Emily Selig has arrived at Cadiz from Patras.


Searching for Crew.
