The Bryans were stopped by the residence of Richard Rodd. It was understood that no one was in the house at the time of his death. Mrs. Bryan, A. B. Andrews, and others were the first to view the body.

 WINNIPEG, July 26.—A cable from London to the Hudson's Bay Company, says that the S.S. Nascope, sunk in Ungava Bay, south of Hudson Straits, north of North China, on July 23. C.P. STEAMSHIP PRESIDENT DEAD.
 LONDON, July 26.—G. M. Bosworth, Chairman of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Lines, died in London to-day. Death followed an operation for appendicitis. George Morton Bosworth was born at Ogdensburg, N.Y., in 1857. He entered the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway as an assistant general freight agent, for Ontario and Quebec lines, in 1882. In January, 1884, he was appointed freight traffic manager of the Canadian Pacific system, and in 1901 he was promoted fourth Vice-President in Montreal, in charge of the Company's traffic, and in connection with the Canadian Pacific Ocean Steamship Lines. On September 1918, he was appointed Chairman of the Canadian Pacific Steamship. Mr. Bosworth sailed from Montreal on June 8, for England, on Company business.
