Marriage Made Easy.
The Ontario Government will earn the gratitude of all the coy maidens and love-struck swains who after the 1st of July contemplate matrimony in this Province. The new law for the sale of licenses and for regulating marriage comes in force on that date. For two dollars the ardent youth who wishes to be united "for better, for worse," to the angel of his choice can have the necessary levense, and if his scanty means don't even reach that figure, he can boldly go to a clergyman, get him to proclaim the bans once, and then all is plain sailing. These bans must be proclaimed either before or after service in the church in which one of the parties has been in the habt of attending, or in which the minister who is to perform the ceremony officiates, and in the district or county where one of the parties has been must heabt of attending, or in which the minister who is to perform the ceremony officiates, and in the district or county where one of the parties has had his or her place of abode for fifteen days previous to the proclamation.
