Latest News Items.

The town of Yale, B. C., has been destroyed by fire.

The Irish Land Bill is now law, having passed both Houses of Parliament and received the Royal Assent.

The Princess Louise has gone to Paris.

It is reported that many of the Russian nobility have recently joined the Nihilists and have furnished funds to murder the Czar and his brother Vladimir.

The Hon. Geo. Brown died forty-seven days after he was shot. This is the fifty-fourth for President Garfield.

It is stated that the President's physician decided some time ago to charge \$100 a day each for their services during the time of the President's illness.

An international band tournament will be held at Ingersoll on Wednesday and Thursday of next week, August 31 and Sept. 1, which promises to be the most successful affair of the kind yet attempted in Ontario.

Lacan, Aug. 20.—Wm. Frise and James Alway were sinking a well on the Kent, adjoining the village, three days ago. Frise's son was drawn up insensible from the effects of foul air, and is yet confined to his bed. Yesterday another unsuccessful attempt was made to go down, and this morning about nine Frise and Alway again went to commence work. Frise descended with the understanding that he should be drawn up again at a given signal.

He filled one bucket which was in process of being drawn up, when he shouted for an empty bucket to be let down. He succeeded in getting into this, and when within ten feet of the surface he became insensible, lost his hold on the draw rope and tumbled into the well, a distance of 30 feet, killing him instantly. In endeavoring to recover the body Alway would have suffered the same fate only he was caught by the men above.

Washington, Aug. 17.—A report reached the goal early this morning that the president was dying, and the information was conveyed to Gaitenau when the prisoners emptied their tubs. Soon after a sentry reported to McGill that Gaitenau was acting strangely, and on going into his cell McGill saw the assassin lying on his bed in a partly recumbent position. Suspecting that he attempted suicide, the officer entered the cell and observed a knife in the assassin's hand. Drawing a revolver McGill leveled it at Gaitenau and demanded the knife. The revolver was not cocked, and was drawn merely to intimidate. When the knife was first demanded the prisoner replied, "By G— I haven't got a knife," and upon reiteration of his command the guard approached nearer and to the right of the prisoner. There was a space of about two feet between them. Gaitenau sprang to his feet, and leaping forward made a downward sweep with his knife, cutting the outer clothes of the guard. He made a rapid retrograde movement and secured the guard's arms. A furious struggle ensued and lasted fully five minutes before the pistol was discharged and assistance came. Gaitenau then released his hold and dropped on his bed crying, "They are trying to kill me; give me my pistol, it belongs to me." He was secured and locked up and the knife taken from the cell.

Washington, Aug. 24.—The President has not gained to-day. He has had a higher fever, which began earlier than is usual with his febrile rise. In the afternoon an incision was made in the swollen parotid gland by Dr. Hamilton. The flow of pus therefrom was small. The one favorable symptom of his swallowing liquid food with apparent relish and digestion has continued, but the general feeling up to midnight is one of increased anxiety.

Lightning Struck Underground.
As well known, there are many plants which thrust their seed vessels into the ground where the seeds are subsequently sown. The peanut is a good example of a plant which constantly exhibits this phenomenon. Others again develop flowers and seeds entirely underground while many aquatic plants ripen their seeds under water. The Persians, who are extensive cultivators of melons, have the curious practice of covering this fruit with earth at a certain stage. Such a method is in vogue among Persians who live in the neighborhood of Tiflis, in the Caucasus. Only the choicest and best keeping variety, the true Druina, is grown. It is a long, succulent kind, which attains a weight of fifteen to twenty pounds, will keep till Christmas. The deeply ridged ground is thrown up into a bank a foot wide in spring, and the seeds are sown in a drill along the center. Finally, the plants are left at a great distance apart, and irrigation is affected through channels between the beds, so that no water touches the plants. The fruit sets in June, and only one or two are left on each shoot. When the fruit has attained the size of a man's fist, the earth is hallowed out, and the shoot (with the exception of the tip, together with its fruit, is buried in the soil to a depth of one to one and a half inches, where it remains until the fruit is almost ripe. Conceivable practical experience is necessary in order to be able to determine the exact moment when the melons should be unearthed. When the cultivator thinks that the time has arrived, he withers the shoot and its fruit from the ground. This is done toward evening, and the fruit is left on the surface of the ground attached to the shoot, and exposed to the dew of one night, but care is taken to cut the fruit the next morning before the sun can reach it. It is then hung in a cool, dark, dry place, until ready for eating.

WILL PRICES GO UP OR DOWN.

A Talk About Grain and Produce Speculations—Crop Prospects—Artificial Prices—High and Low—Bulls and Bears—The Time to Sell, etc.

In the present rage of speculation in Grain, etc., the following explanation of the ways and doings of the "bulls" and "bears," will be of very great interest. It is from the pen of Mr. Orange Judd, in the *American Agriculturist* for Sept. 1st.

How Gambling in Grain, etc., is Done.

During two or three years past, and never so greatly as now, the methods of the Stock Exchange have been introduced into the produce markets, and hundreds of men, in leading cities, notably in Chicago, Toledo, St. Louis, Baltimore, Cincinnati, and New York, are daily betting millions of dollars upon the probable prices of wheat, flour, corn, oats, lard, pork, bacon, etc. To illustrate: Mr. A. offers to deliver to Mr. B. a million bushels of No. 2 Red wheat at \$1.23 per bushel, on the 31st day of August, though he (Mr. A.) does not own a single bushel of wheat, and does not expect to. Mr. B. takes the offer, and makes a deposit of the price or "margin." In this case Mr. A. is said to be "short," and Mr. B. "long." Mr. A. is "short" of what he has agreed to deliver. If the closing sale of this grade of wheat on August 31 is only \$1.20, Mr. B. pays Mr. A. 2 cents a bushel, or \$20,000. But if the price is \$1.25, Mr. A. pays Mr. B. 3 cents a bushel, or \$30,000. Usually no wheat is actually delivered. Sometimes, however, if there is a limited supply of wheat available, and Mr. B. has capital enough, he secretly buys up all there is; he gets up a "corner" in wheat; and when settling day comes, he may require Mr. A. to deliver the wheat or he may get others to try to buy it, while he refuses to sell until \$1.30, or \$1.40 or even \$1.50 is offered and the price of the day is fixed at that rate.

In the last named case, Mr. A. would have to pay him the difference between \$1.22 and \$1.50, which on a million bushels would be \$281,000,000, or \$281,000. If, on the contrary, the price could be beat down on the settling day to \$1.00 per bushel, Mr. B. would have to pay Mr. A. 22 cents a bushel, or \$220,000. We have named only two individuals, but there are hundreds or thousands of persons doing the same thing, some betting on a few thousands bushels, others on hundreds of thousands, and a few heavy operators on millions. In times of excitement and activity the speculative "sales" of wheat during a few days amount to more than the entire surplus crop of the country during a year. The operators are in two classes, those like Mr. A. are "shorts," and those like Mr. B. are "longs." Precisely the same operations are taking place with reference to other grades of wheat, corn, oats, lard, pork, etc. The same man often operates in several kinds of produce, and may be "short" of one and long of another. One speculator will often be short for August delivery; long for September; and short or long for October, or for "the year."

General Conclusions as to Selling.
The leading facts and circumstances on both sides are set forth above. The great operators grain and other produce, both "bulls" and "bears," have immense sums at stake. They are each spending large amounts of money to privately ascertain the actual facts of the case, and are far better informed than ordinary farmers or dealers can be. Indeed, the common mass of speculators take their cue from the movements of these leaders. If prices were sure to go up in the future, the bulls would buy all the wheat offered at present, and even higher rates. If the bears were sure of a decline, they would oversell the market very largely. For ourselves, we believe future prices are just about as likely to go up as down, or down as up. So, the only safe rule for us is, to sell when ready, to take as little risk as possible of damage in storage; and being ready, and having sold to simply say, "I have done the best I could." "What if prices go down, say, 'Well, I was lucky.' If they go up, 'I might have done better to hold on, but if I had, it might have been different, and so I will not worry over it."

London, Aug. 23.—Estimate's annual report shows that on the whole the crops of France are not up to those of last year, but that wheat is much below the average, and will likely realize only ten million quarters; barley ten per cent. above the average, and oats twenty per cent. below. In Austria-Hungary the crops are good all round. In the Turkish provinces on the Danube, wheat is medium. Other crops good. The barley crop in Russia doubles that of last year, but is poorer in quality. None of the crops in Germany are up to the average. The Swiss crops are of good quality. Wheat is poor in quantity. All the crops in Spain are bad. In Belgium the wheat is far below the average. Barley fair. All cereals in Holland are in good condition. All reports from the United States agree that the yield will be under the average.
