## FINE AND COOLER.

## In the Dining-Room.

## SATURDAY, OCT. 30.

**BREAKFAST**—Grapes. Quaker oats blanc mange. Baked sausages. Corn muffins. Coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Bread and butter. Stewed tomatoes. Parsnip fritters. Honey cake. Cocoa.

**DINNER**—Stuffed braised beef with brown sauce. Baked squash. Macaroni. Sweet potato salad. French dressing. Harvard pudding. Apple and hard sauce.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

**Quaker Oats**—Bring one quart sweet milk to a boil, add saltspoon salt and stir in one cupful quaker oats; cook thirty minutes. Just before removing from the fire stir in two eggs, very well beaten. Serve either hot or cold, with cream or sugar.

**Breaded Sausages**—Wipe the sausages dry. Dip them in beaten egg and bread crumbs. Put them in the frying basket and plunge into boiling fat. Cook ten minutes. Serve with a garnish of toasted bread and parsley.

**Braised Beef**—Take a slice from the top of the round, weighing about three pounds, and cut one and a half inches thick. Season it with a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter teaspoonful of pepper; cut gashes in the top and sides and fill with stuffing. Roll the meat up and skewer it; dredge with flour and brown it in a frying pan in some salt pork fat. Put it into the braising-pan, with one-third of a cup of carrots cut into dice, three slices of onion and a small bit of bay leaf. Pour on three cupfuls of boiling water and simmer three hours.

**Stuffing**—One-third of a cup of rolled cracker crumbs, to which has been added a scant tablespoonful butter, a saltspoon salt, a speck of pepper, and one-half teaspoonful of thyme, summer savory or sweet marjoram, or such mixed seasoning as is liked. Moistened the whole with four tablespoonfuls of hot milk or water.

**Sauce**—Brown two tablespoonfuls of butter, adding two round tablespoonfuls of flour, and stir until the whole becomes brown. Pour on to this slowly the liquor in the meat pan, which should be about one pint.

**Sweet Potato Salad**—Boil three large sweet potatoes. Cut into half-inch squares. Cut into very small pieces two stalks of celery. Season with salt and pepper and pour over a French dressing as follows: Three tablespoonfuls salad oil, two of vinegar, one teaspoonful onion juice, one saltspoon each salt and pepper. Let salad stand in refrigerator two hours. Garnish with pickles, pitted olives and parsley.

**Harvard Pudding**—Sift together two and one-third cups of flour, one-half cup of fine granulated sugar, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-quarter of a teaspoonful of salt. Work into this with the tips of the fingers one-third of a cupful of butter. Beat one egg light, add a cupful of milk and turn onto the dry ingredients. Pour the mixture into a buttered mold and steam two hours. Do not allow the water to stop boiling for an instant.

**Sauce**—Serve this pudding with a simple apple sauce and a hard sauce. For the latter cream one-third of a cup of butter, adding slowly one cup of powdered sugar, one teaspoonful of lemon juice and three-quarters of a teaspoonful of vanilla. This combination is a pleasant change from either flavor alone.

BOXES NOT FOR PAPERS.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

**The Postmaster-General Said To Be About to Issue a New Order Regarding the Use of the Letter Boxes.**

It is understood that the postal department will shortly issue instructions and inaugurate some material changes. One of these is that in future newspapers and other periodicals shall not be mailed in street letter boxes. In the experience of the department, a large proportion of the letters mailed in the street boxes, get mixed up with the newspapers mailed there, and in that way the risk of loss to the letters is materially increased. It is also the intention of the department to arrange that all persons who are licensed to seal stamps shall also be licensed to mail a letter box, into which letters may be mailed the same as at the central postoffice.

Postmaster Dawson said this morning that he had heard nothing regarding these instructions as yet. He did not approve of stuffing the letter boxes full of circulars and papers, and leaving papers on the top of the box. It was an old trouble. He much preferred the posting of papers and circulars at the general office. The postmaster said it would be of benefit if the department introduced in cities the pillar boxes for both letters and papers. In regard to letter boxes being placed in the stores where stamps are sold, Mr. Dawson said it would be a great convenience, no doubt, but would entail much more labor. The revenue of the office was greatly increased.

## CANTANKEROUS CREES.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 29.—It is reported that all the troublesome Canadian Cree Indians, who occasioned so much correspondence between the two governments a year ago, resulting in the United States troops rounding the Indians up and escorting them back to Canada, have returned and are more troublesome than ever. They are slaughtering game protected by the state, and killing cattle on the ranches, and ranchers are appealing to the authorities for protection.
