QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

TAXPAYER .- What is the Christmas vacation allowed by law at the Collegiate Institute, and has the board of education authority to shorten or lengthen the same? Ans.—The legal holidays are between Dec. 23 and Jan. 3, exclusive of these days. The board of education has no power legally to add to or shorten the holidays, which are fixed by act of the Legislature.
2. If the board has no authory to lengthen the holidays, what penalty or other remedy is there to prevent the breach of the law? Ans.-The statute provides no penalty, and the remedy lies in the hands of the ratepayers not to elect trustees who disregard the law. The matter might be represented to the minister of justice with a view to amending the law providing a penalty, or it might be tested in the courts by an action to restrain the trustees paying salaries out of the public funds to the teachers for holidays granted by the board and compelling them to pay personally for

CHRISTMAS .- Can the city council change the date of Christmas, or make Monday the holiday for celebrating it? Ans.-No; the council have no power to change the date of Christmas for religious and secular reasons. They could not make Monday a legal holiday for banks and public offices, or any-thing beyond making a request to the citizens, while Dec. 25 would still be a legal holiday as to banks and puboffices, and be the Christmas the Christian church, as to which the city council has necessarily no con-
