In his letter the ex-Premier says he does not feel qualified to take part in the proceedings now contemplated until he can see a better prespect of obtaining a practical result and until he is satisfied that a mode can be found offering such a union without involving any concession to the principle of protection.

The Conservatives and Unionist delegates chosen number 7,960 and Socialists 521. The Radicals demand a separate Ministry of Foreign Affairs for Norway as the first step in the direction of home rule in that country. STARTLING STATEMENTS

Mystery.

A Woman Confesses to Having Done the Dreadaul Deed.

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 14 - "Clarence Robinson did not do it. It was I who committed the murder. I killed Montgomery Gibbs." Such was the startling statement made by a woman in the matron's room of the central police station yesterday morning. The woman's name was Sarah Robinson, wife of Clarence Robinson, alias Meses Stone, the convicted burglar, who so eloquently pleaded his own case in the criminal court the other day, and who on Saturday was found guilty of

On the night of April 28 Montgemery Gibbs, a prominent young lawyer of Buffalo, was found dying on Delaware avenue, Buffalo, with an ugly bullet hole in his head. He died without regaining consciousness. Gibbs was a single man, and all sorts of theories were advanced. The most promising elew was the marks of a women's shoe on the sidewalk near where the body had been found. The footprints were such as to indicate that the woman whose shoes had made them was in the act

The second chapter of the story begins in a traveling minstrel show of which Clarence and Sarah Robinson were the managers and proprietors. Early last spring at Jamesown, N. Y., the combination went to pieces. That was just two weeks before the Budalo mystery. From Jamestown the pair went to Buffalo "strapped" financially. They remained there a short time and later it developed that Robinson wanted to come to Cleveland with his wife and in order to do so he was compelled to pawn his watch and overcoat. For some reason or other it was suspected that he knew something of the murder of Gibbs, and when he came to Cleveland he was questioned closely. He claimed that on the night of the murder he was sick in bed in Buffalo and his wife was with him.

Early in the summer there were a number of daylight burglaries committed here in the east end. Evidence pointed to the guilt of Robinson, and he was arrested and has been in the county jail ever since await-

A week ago reports of daylight robberies in the East End came to police headquarters again, all committed in private residences. Among the last of the homes was one in which Mrs. Robinson had been engaged as servant. She insisted that she was innocent. On Friday the woman was again questioned, and this time about the Buffalo murder. She finally broke down and said: "Neither I nor my husband committed the Buffalo murder, but I can tell you who did." And another question elicited the information that an acquaintance of hers named Flannigan, now in the county jail under a two-years sentence for burglary, was guilty of the Buffalo murder.

Yesterday morning Deputy Chief Cusack, of Buffalo, arrived in the city. Mrs. Robinson had an understanding with the police officers that she would be at a certain place in town at a certain hour. The hour arrived, but Mrs. Robinson was not at hand. Two policeman called for her then and took her to the police station, when she

denied her previous statements. Clarence Robinson was then brought to the central. He did not know that his wife was in the building, and the wife was ignorant of her husband's presence. Robinson was questioned about his wife's allegations concerning Flannigan, and finally Cusack charged Robinson directly with the murder. Robinson claimed that he was sick on the night of the tragedy and his wife was with him.

The party then went to where Sarah Robinson was confined. Cusack said to her he was confident that Robinson was the one who committed the murder. At that the woman broke down, cried like a child and made the confession as given.

BUFFALO, Oct. 14. - Mrs. Sarah Robinson, the woman brought here last night from Cleveland charged with the murder of Montgomery Gibbs, made a statement to the police today. According to her story she and her husband set out that night to hold up someone. They selected a long dark block on Delaware avenue and walked up and down laying in wait for the first well dressed man who came along, Gibbs was the map. When Robinson demanded his valuables Gibbs struck at him. and Robinson fired two shots, one of which inflicted the fatal wound in the temple. Chief Detective Cusack believes that he has
