INCLOSED BY ICE.

Giant Bergs Threaten to Crush a Vessel.

But Just as Hope Had Fled the Flee Opened and Scattered.

New York, Aug. 10.—Following close upon the experience had by Capt. Joseph Swain, of the American bark Alice with ice in the South Atlantic Ocean, comes that of the ship New City, which has just arrived. Like the Alice, the New City was imprisoned among the gigantic floes, and for a time it looked as if she would be crushed, and her fate and that of her crew would be added to the already long list of mysteries of the sea.

The New City is commanded by Capt. Bray and sailed from Talat and Valparaiso, Chili, 94 days ago. Capt. Bray has made many voyages around the Horn, and he says that the one just ended is the most eventful in his life. In rounding the "Point of Storms," as the Horn is called by sailors, the ship encountered very rough weather. She was beaten and battered about until she creaked and groaned from the strain upon her. Being a staunch craft, however, she weathered the hurricane and cyclones, only to sail into what might have been death.

There is a belief among sailors that divine Providence keeps a more careful watch over those who follow the sea than over other people, and this seems to be true, judging from the narrow escape of those on the New City.

The ship passed Cape Horn on June 6, and was sailing along before a spanking breeze, when two mammoth icebergs were sighted on June 20. They were a great way off, and the course of the vessel was changed slightly to port so as to pass them by. The ship sailed along, all the time the two icebergs on the starboard growing larger and larger, until they looked like huge mountains.

Far away could be seen many more, dotting the ocean on all sides. As day faded and night settled the moon arose, shedding its bright light over the ocean, lighting up the bergs until they presented a spectral sight, which to the eyes of the sailors took all sorts of shapes. On the ice the mariners thought they saw houses, churches and trees.

As the night wore on more icebergs, some of them towering a thousand feet in the air, appeared until the big ship was entirely shut in. With the rising of the sun the wind died out, and it required the whole attention of the captain and crew to see that their vessel was kept from coming in contact with any of the bergs. For a whole day the vessel remained in her perilous position, and the crew was considering whether or not they might not have to seek refuge on the ice, when the bergs seemed to disappear, one by one, until there was an opening large enough for the New City to pass through. The vessel continued on her way, reaching this port in safety.
