GOING TO TORONTO.

S. Potter, superintendent of the London street railway, is severing his connection with the company here, and on the 1st of June goes to Toronto, where he will assume the position of electrical engineer of the Toronto street railway. No arrangements have yet been made for the appointment of Mr. Potter's successor.

SHIPPING AT THE PORT.

The schooner M. L. Breck, Capt. Sutherland, arrived at Port Stanley yesterday from Swigley Bay with 2,800 cedar fence posts, 235,000 feet of lumber, 163,000 shingles.

The car ferry steamer Shenango arrived at Port Stanley at 2 o'clock Tuesday, with 24 cars of coal for Toronto, London and St. Thomas. She left with 15 cars of steel.

The steamer Melbourne, Capt. Le-forde, arrived at Port Stanley at 11 o'clock Tuesday night with merchandise consigned to the L. E. and D. R. R.

DECIDED ON A SITE.

A commission representing the Presbyterian Synod of Hamilton and London, consisting of Revs. Dr. McMullen, Dr. Johnston, Messrs. A. Henderson and E. Cockburn, and Mr. I. Rathburn, elder, met at the Presbyterian Church, Botany, on Tuesday, to arrange, if possible, the selection of a new church site.

One section of the congregation wished the church built on the site of the old building; the other wished it located about a mile and a half to the east, near the Botany postoffice.

After listening to both sides, the commission decided that it would be best to build the church at the Botany postoffice site.

LETTER FROM PTE. MULLINS.

Pte. Ernest Mullins, city, in writing from Bloomsfontein, under date of April 20, to Miss Robertson, 445 Central avenue, city, states that his health is not of the best, he having just recovered from fever. He states that there are over 100 Canadians in the hospital with fever, and that in the last few days nine of them died and were buried. He further says that a number of the others are not likely to recover. All the men get in the hospital is an oil sheet and a blanket on the ground at night. The poor fellows, the letter says, simply lay and shiver, and their sufferings are terrible.

The writer was a member of Wolseley Barracks, and had just returned from the Klondike expedition when the call was made for volunteers for South Africa, and he enlisted at once. He is an expert with the gatling gun, and has done some good work in the field.

EMPIRE DAY CELEBRATIONS

Flag Raisings and Patriotic Exercises at the Public Schools.

Many Excellent Programmes Given—Patriotism to the Empire the keynote of the Proceedings—Pleasant Half-Holiday.

Empire Day was celebrated by the scholars of the London public schools yesterday. They were gathered in their respective schools, sang patriotic songs, had pretty drills, unique exercises, excellent programmes, and listened to patriotic speeches, departing with the recollection of a pleasant half-holiday, and a better appreciation of the greatness of the Empire, of which our fair Dominion forms no small part.

At Talbot street school Empire Day was observed by the carrying out of the following programme in a very successful and creditable manner: Chairman's address, Howard Houston; chorus, "Her Majesty," the class; instrumental, Gretta Slater; paper on "England," Meta Kaiser; paper on "Scotland," Harold Little; paper on "Ireland," David Harvey; paper on "Great Britain," Reg. Callard; instrumental, "Scottish Airs," Miss Macklin; recitation, "The Empire," Duet, "Motherland," Pauline Ivey and Essie Stewart; paper on "Canada," Gertrude Taylor; chorus, "The Maple Leaf," the class; recitation, "Our Dead at Modder River," Pauline Ivey; "The Army," Gordon Elliot; recitation, "Bobs," Little; "The Navy," Arthur Reid; recitation, "The Sea-Queen's Waking," Wanda Jarvis; chorus, "Red, White and Blue," the class; solo, "Write a Few Lines to Mother," Bessie Stewart; "The Queen," Ernest Butler; chorus, "The Soldiers of the Queen," the class; instrumental, "Vocalo," Iva Walper; solo and chorus, "It's Only a Small Bit of Bunting," Annie McLeod; chorus, "God Save Our Queen," the class.

MAPLE AVENUE SCHOOL.

Empire Day in Maple avenue school was ushered in by the singing of national songs. This was followed by talks on the empire by the teachers. The children were then presented to the children. Drawings of the flag were made on the board, the teachers explaining the historical formation of the Union Jack. The rooms were prettily decorated with flags, flowers and bunting, while flags floated from the front windows of the building.

In the afternoon teachers and pupils assembled on the lawn in front of the school for further display of loyalty. The principal, Mr. H. B. Beal, spoke for a few minutes. His remarks, eloquently suggestive of patriotism, rang with a sincere appeal that Canadians would continue in their expressions of loyalty. Then followed the singing of national songs by the children. "Her Majesty" was enthusiastically sung by the two principal classes, accompanied by the waving of flags. The flag was then hoisted by eight little tots from the primary room amid a spirited outburst of "God Save the Queen." The flag is a much-prized trophy of the school, being won by an ex-pupil, Miss Rose Merritt, for the best written essay on patriotism in Ontario, the Toronto Mail being the donor.

QUEBEC STREET SCHOOL.

At Quebec street school Empire Day was celebrated by marching to the singing of patriotic songs, the rooms being prettily decorated with flags.

The Queen, the greatness of the empire, loyalty, and the brave part taken by Canadians in South Africa, were the topics talked about.

PRINCESS AVENUE SCHOOL.

The pupils of Princess avenue school will long remember the 23rd of May, 1900. Parents and friends of the scholars gathered in large numbers to witness the carrying out of a very interesting and excellently prepared programme.

The children assembled as usual at 1:30, and promptly at 2 o'clock marched to their respective places on the lawn in front of the school, where flag-pole and platform had been erected.

Flags and decorations of all kinds were seen in profusion. The programme consisted of patriotic addresses by the following gentlemen: Rev. W. J. Clark, Rev. Canon Dalin, Rev. E. C. Oakley, and Mr. R. M. McElhannon, the energetic secretary of the school board, all of which were enthusiastically received. Patriotic choruses were rendered by the children, under the able leadership of Prof. Burton. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed during the singing of "When Johnny Canuck Comes Home," when the Union Jack was hoisted by Edna Victoria Bland representing Canada, assisted by Hazel Gillean, as England, Sarah McNorton as Scotland, and Mary Mara as Ireland. There were also on the platform pupils in khaki uniform, soldiers, sailors and Highlanders, all of which gave a charm to the scene. Recitations were given in good style by Cyril Imrie and Alma Fax. One of the brightest numbers on the programme was a song entitled "The Canadian Flag," by Edna Bland, May McMahon, Edna Blanchard, Mary Craig, Nellie Spry, Wentworth Dowell, Walter Warner and Willie Grundy. Special mention must be made of Dr. Ziegler, who rendered a solo in excellent voice. For some time past the pupils of the senior grades have been preparing essays on patriotic subjects in anticipation of this event. ST. GEORGE'S SCHOOL.

The scholars, under the command of Principal Baker and captains for each grade, marched from the school ground along Oxford, Colborne, St. James and Richmond streets to the Renwick common. Col. Fisher inspected the pupils in marching and drilling, and highly complimented the classes for their excellent work. Grade V, and Capt. Laskey won first place in marching, and Capt. Taggie, with Grade VII, won first for drill. All the pupils then formed a hollow square.

The trooping of the colors and salute by twelve girls and twelve boys, carrying the Union Jack, Canadian, St. George, St. Andrew and St. Patrick flags, under command of Capt. Evans, was a very pretty exhibition. A large number of the parents were present to witness the ceremony. The children then went to St. James' Church lecture hall, where a programme was introduced by the chairman, Trustee Walter Morgan. Dr. Sowerby gave an impressive oration on the Empire. In glowing terms he spoke of its vastness, its noble Queen, the gallantry of its colonies. He directed their attention to the fact that not armies, but education, civilization and cultivation make the empire. Miss Elsie Drewe, in a thoughtful and patriotic address, presented to Chairman Bayly a crayon portrait of the late Private Adams, to be hung in the hall of St. George's school. In reply, Mr. Bayly eulogized the memory of the young St. George's boy, who, at the first call had volunteered to fight for his Queen and empire. He spoke in glowing terms of the unity of the empire and of the magnificent showing that has already been made by the Canadian contingent.

The picture, draped with a Union Jack, was then unveiled by Chairman Bayly.
