—The Foresters.
Dr. Cronby, the supreme chief
ranger, L. O. F., has just returned from
Madison, Wis., where he attended the
High Court of that State, and reports that
the order in that part of the Foresteric
jurisdiction is rapidly growing, the returns
of the different officers showing a satis-
fying increase during the past year. The

avenue school was passed. Communi-

do the plumbing of the schools were
laid over. Some seats belonging to the

Canners' Complaints.
TORONTO, Feb. 9.—The president of the
Canadian Packers' Association, in his an-
nual address to-day, said the competition
among canners and packers had been so
keen that prices were 25 per cent. below
those of the United States. Even at these
figures, he said, packers could not export
to that country on account of the McKinley
Bill; he recommended that an organized
effort should be made to send the surplus
goods to Great Britain.
