Dr. W. C. Gallagher then took the stand. He said he had known Murray Hall about a year, and that cancer of the breast was a disease peculiar to women. When asked if he did not know that Murray Hall was a woman

THE FORESTERS

Supreme Court I. O. F. Vindicated-Dr. Coulter's Charges Fall to the Ground.

New York, Jan. 29.—The applicaion by Dr. Charles L. Coulter for an injunction restraining the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters from continuing certain alleged extravagant practices, and from interfering by threats or otherwise with the plaintiff and his attorney and witnesses in prosecuting certain actions brought by him, was today denied by Justice Blanchard in the Supreme Court.

The plaintiff claimed the organization was practically insolvent, and had expended over \$400,000 in collecting an income of \$2,500,000 last year. The defendants denied all the allegations tions of mismanagement, and showed that the order had now 170,000 members in the United States and Canada

and a surplus of \$4,000,000. Another of Dr. Coulter's charges was that the association declined to accept black or yellow men as members, while it had elected as its supreme

while it had elected as its supreme chief ranger a Mohawk Indian.

The defendants, in reply to this, said that Dr. Oronhyatekha was a full-blooded Mohawk Indian, who was a licentiate of the Ontario Medical Council; an under graduate of Oxford University, England; a graduate of Toronto University, and was last year the president of the National Fraternal Congress of America. He had been at the head of the order since 1881, when it had only 369 members, and had since been engaged in building up the association, while Dr. Coulter now seemed to be employed in an endeavor to destroy it, if he possibly could do

Justice Blanchard, in denying the motion for the injunction, said that all the allegations charging malad-ministration of the defendant and the doubtful solvency of the order had been fully met. He denied the motion with \$10 costs.

TWO CHILDREN BURNED TO CINDERS

Mother Saved Several by Throwing Them From a Window.

Bessemer, Mich., Jan. 29 .- The residence of Louis Beissel burned Sunday night. The charred remains of a boy 4 and girl 6 years old were taken out of the ruins.

Mrs. Beissel is in a critical condition, being severely burned, and is not ex-pected to live. She saved several of the children by throwing them from the second-story window. A lamp explosion was the cause. No insurance.
