# FOR FREE SUGAR!

Agitation Organized in Chicago---Said To Be a Sly Move to Crush Beet Sugar Industry.

Times says:

Wholesale grocers of Chicago and persons interested in the sugar trade are discussing pro and con a petition now being widely but quietly circulated in the Chicago congressional districts praying for the abolishment of the tariff on raw sugar, and asking for a signatures to be presented to congress, when it meets in December. Three or four copies of the petition are now being signed in each congressional dis-

rict in Cook county. The petition is sent out ostensibly by the National Pure Food Association, which has its headquarters at Broad-way and Chambers street in New York. But it also is being circulated by agents of the United States Export Association, which has its head-quarters in the same building. F. B. Thurber is president of both organizations, and Hylton Swan is secretary. against

Chicago, Nov. 13. - The Chicago of the wholesale grocery firm of H. K. & F. B. Thurber, of New York. In substance the petition calls on all jobbers and large consumers of sugar to join in a petition to congress to do away with the sugar tariff, because it save consumers of the country \$60,000,000 annually, and give the people refined sugar at a cost of 3 or 4 cents a pound. It would, the petition states, result in fair competition becane and beet sugar interests, of which consumers would get the benefit, and in a great increase in the manufacture of preserves, confection-ery, etc. This would drive out the "English trade importations in these

goods, and would benefit fruit growers, manufacturers and all alike." While some Chicago jobbers agree with the arguments of this petition, and look on it as a good move, there are others who are inclined to regard it as a sly move of the sugar trust, intended to influence congress to admit Cuban sugar duty free and so put an end to the most dangerous competition against the trust-the beet sugar in

# FIGHTING ON THE FRONTIER

Of India --- Afghan Post of 200 Troops Attacked by Jehandad Khan's Followers.

The British Army Will Try a New Rifle---London Paper Thinks Premier Will Quit--- New Railroad Planned for London.

FIGHTING ON INDIA'S FRONTIER. of threes and fours, has an aggregate Lendon, Nov. 13 .- "It is reported approaching one hundred. here," says the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, that Jehandad Khan, who fled from Afghanistan on the death of the ameer has been making trouble on the Indian frontier. He gathered several hundred followers, and attacked an Afghan post of 200 troops, commanded by Ali Akbar, near the frontier. Ali Akbar drove the rebels over the frontier, losing one officer and nine sol-

diers killed. "The British authorities, according to report, then arrested Ali Akbar, while Jehandad Khan fled to Kurram Valley. Habib Ullah has ordered the

troops to pursue Khan." SALISBURY MAY RETIRE. Referring to Lord Salisbury's speech

last Saturday night at the Guildhall, Truth says: "The careless composition of the speech of the premier, which contained some singularly obscure sentences has revived the talk of his impending retirement and has given cause for believing at least that he no longer takes an earnest interest in po-

litical life."

A NEW RIFLE. The Daily News makes the following announcement: "Owing to Lord Roberts' conviction that the sabre and lance have seen their best days and must be replaced even for cavalry by rifles, while the bulk of the infantry must henceforth be mounted, the small arms committee was instructed some months ago to find a modified form of the Lee-Enfield suitable for all arms. As a result the committee has decided in favor of shortening the barrel five inches and increasing the twist of the rifle in order to compensate for the loss of range and accuracy, adding a ten-cartridge clip action. An experimental issue of a thousand will be made soon.'

NEW RAILROAD PLANNED FOR

LONDON. At yesterday's meeting of the London County Council a proposal was unanimously adopted to ask the consent of parliament to the construction of subways and a shallow tramway Victoria embankment under New street to Holburn connecting a little further north with surface trains. In the course of the session the delegates who recently visited the United States described the systems in Bos-ton and New York; J. Williams Bonn declaring his conviction that what had been done in those American cities could be done in London, and efforts should be made before subterranean London was handed over to foreign control. This statement was greeted with considerable applause.

THE GALE CONTINUES. The gale which has been sweeping over Great Britain and Ireland for the past two days continues unabated at many coast points. Over the Welsh lowlands the torrential rains are increasing, causing disastrous floods. Reports of wrecks and casualties continue to float in. The death list, made up

The northern and eastern portions of the Island of Jamaica are cut off from Kingston by heavy weather. Rivers have overflowed their banks and are doing considerable damage to the railroad line to Port Antonio and the north side towns. The extent of the damage is not known owing to the interruption of telegraphic communication. No loss of life is reported.

THE KING'S LUCK AT SHOOTING In spite of the gale and undeterred by the beating rain, King Edward, the Prince of Wales and a distinguished party spent yesterday shooting pheasants in Windsor Park. His Majesty, who appeared to be in excellent health, seemed to enjoy the sport and secured a good bag.

CHINESE ARSENALS VERY BUSY. Telegraphing from Hankow, Nov. 5, the Pekin corespondent of the Times,

Dr. Morrison, says: "The Yang Tse valley is now peaceful, and no doubt is entertained that the court will return to Pekin. Trade is very active here. The manufacture of arms and ammunition is proceeding on a great scale at all the principal Chinese arsenals. There are 2,000 workmen in the Hankow arsenal and 2,500 in the arsenal at Shanghai. Forty thousand gun stocks were recently imported, and 15,000 Mausers are now ready for distribution. Large contracts for the supply of rifles are being negotiated by the representatives

of European firms." TEN PERISHED IN FIRE. The Mandelevitch building, one of the finest blocks in Odessa, which includes a fashionable arcade of shops, has been destroyed by fire. Ten persons perished and thirty-five others were injured. The damage is estimated at 1,000,000 roubles.

## DISMISSED BY SUPREME COURT.

London Litigant Wins Long Drawn Out Legal Case.

Outcome May Have Important Effect on Pending Cases Involving London Citizens.

A case of considerable local interest, and one likely to have considerable bearing upon pending litigation Boston Business Men Will Interview Presiin which several Londoners are involved, has just been disposed of by the supreme court at Ottawa. The case has been in the courts for two years and a half. It commenced in April, 1899, when A. Wilson, of the Wilson Varnish Company, of London and Montreal, entered suit against John F. Ellis, vice-president of the Toronto board of the Highway Advertising Company, to recover \$1,000 paid by him for stock in the company on their alleged fraudulent represen-

tation to him that they had paid in \$50,000 cash for stock of the company held by them, when in fact they had paid nothing. The case was tried in this city in December, 1899, by Chief Justice Armour. He found that de-ceit, as alleged, had been practiced upon the plaintiff Wilson, and he gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$1,000 and interest, cancelled the stock, and ordered the defendants to pay the costs of the action. From this judgment appeal taken direct to the appeal court.

judgment was sustained, the sitting judges being Messrs. Justices Osler, Lister, Moss and McLennan. Mr. Justice Osler took occasion to score the defendants for the methods employed in the organization of the company.
