
METEOROLOGICAL

Winter Assizes Will Be Continued Next

The jury in the case of Burke vs. Burke et al., last night returned a verdict for the plaintiff awarding her \$1,000 damages. The jury held that the plaintiff was rightfully on the premises of the defendant, and that her ejectment was illegal. Counsel for defense contended that the defendant Burke was justified in removing her, even if she had not been guilty of obnoxious acts. Judge Ferguson will hear argument on this point next week. The assizes will continue next week. Judge Ferguson was to have presided with other judges at a session of the divisional court, but he received a telegram from Chief Justice Meredith yesterday saying that court had been postponed, thus leaving Judge Ferguson free to continue the present court.
