Aylesworth's Opinion. Mr. J. H. Beattie, counsel for Mr. John W. Pocock, who claims he was legally elected water commissioner for 1902, has received the following opinion from Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., of

Toronto: "Dear Sir-My opinion is asked upon the validity of the election for water commissioners, held in London

a month ago, upon the following "The meeting for nomination opened at 10 a.m. on the proper day. Within an hour from that time Mr. Pocock and Mr. Jones were duly nominated, there being two commissioners to be elected. At 10 minutes to 11 a.m. the clerk, who was presiding, announced that in the event of not more than the two names being placed in nomination at 11 a.m., they would be elected by acclamation. At 11 a.m. the clerk publicly announced that the time for receiving nomina-tions had expired, and that he had but two names, and in four and a half minutes afterwards a third candidate, Mr. Little, was put in nomination. Mr. Pocock at once objected to Mr. Little's nomination, but after

discussion the clerk contended he had the right to extend the time and accept it. "By the London water commissioners act, 36 Vic., c. 102, sec. 44, it is enacted that the water commissioners shall be elected at the same time and in the same manner as aldermen. At that time the municipal act, 36 Vic., c. 48, s. 104, prescribed that the nomination meeting for aldermen should take place at noon,

and this is still the law so far as London is concerned. Sec. R. S. O. (1897), c. 223, s. 119. "You ask whether the election for water commissioners is valid, the nomination meeting having been held tract of land and premises lying and being in the Town of London East (now in the City of London), in the County of Middlesex, being composed of lot 14 on the east side of Charlotte street, according to a plan and survey of part of lot No. 10, in the first concession of the Township of London, in the County of Middlesex, made by Messrs. accordance with the principles laid down in the act. "I would, however, consider the irregularities in the present case of grave character, as here the nomination proceedings were over before the hour had come which is fixed by the statute for them to begin at. 'You ask my opinion also whether Mr. Pocock is entitled to the seat by acclamation. It is in large part a question of fact. Your statement is that Mr. Little's nomination was pre-sented after the clerk had openly de-

clared the time for receiving nominations had expired. "If it could be clearly established that the hour had expired before Mr. Little was nominated I think the seat would be Mr. Pocock's legal right. I fully concede that if it could be estab-lished that Mr. Little's nomination was after expiration of hour, sec. 128 (2), clearly entitles Mr. Pocock to be elected, and I recognize that a very strong argument in favor of this con-

tention could be presented. "Upon the whole, therefore, my opinion is for the probability that Mr. Pocock would succeed in securing the sea by quo warranto proceedings.
"With regret that I have been unable to give you my views in the mat-

ter, sooner, I remain, your truly, A. B. Aylesworth.
