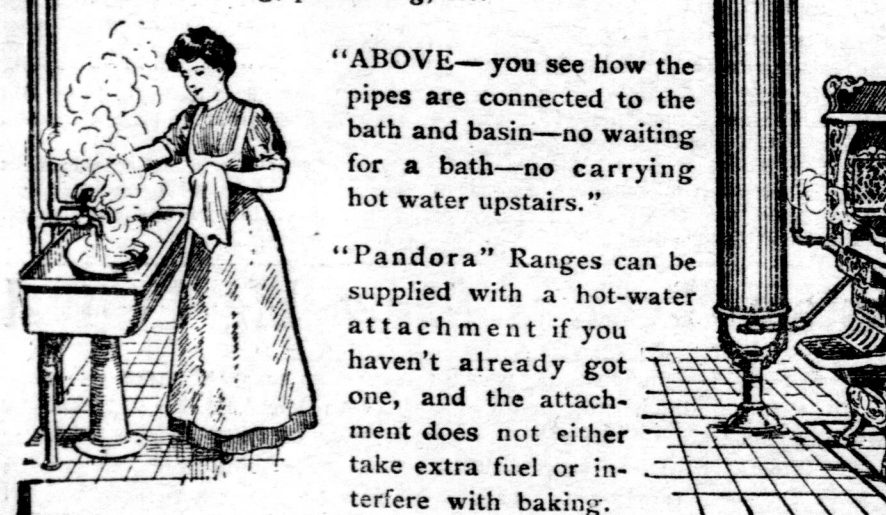

DEATH ENDED
GALLANT FIGHTBrakeman Who Lost Both Legs in
Accident Shows Wonderful
Nerve.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—After a gallant struggle for six days between life and death, John A. McDermott, the C. P. R. brakeman, who early on Monday morning lost both his legs at a siding five miles from Myrtle, died on Saturday night at the Western Hospital. McDermott fell under a moving string of cars in the black darkness and fog. It will be remembered, and had twenty-one of the cars and the locomotive run over him, almost severing his legs from his body. By sheer grit he dragged himself, bleeding and in agony, across two sets of tracks and for fifty feet, where he was found by a search party tying up the bleeding stumps with his shoestrings. He was brought to Toronto and placed in the Western Hospital early on Monday morning. Since that time his conduct at the hospital has been exemplary of great courage. Never has anyone in the history of the institution put up such a struggle against such fearful odds. His great cheerfulness throughout the dreadful week endeared him to nurses, doctors and visitors, and the hospital was plunged in gloom when it was whispered about that he had passed away.

McDermott leaves a young wife and two sons, three years and eighteen months old respectively. He was living at 180 Dundas street west, West Toronto, sharing the house with another young brakeman and his wife. The remains were shipped to Fergus, Ont., this morning at 7:40 o'clock. They were accompanied by the widow and a brother of the deceased. The funeral will be held from the home of the father of the deceased, a few miles east of Fergus, tomorrow morning.

"Hook" Lecavalier, a Montreal mail driver, left his wagon on a corner, and \$100 is missing. It is feared he has been the victim of foul play.

Miss Carrie Miller, of Galt, was yesterday asphyxiated by coal gas. Her cousin, Mrs. Patton, had a narrow escape.

IS LORD MINTO
ABOUT TO RESIGN?

Poor Health of His Wife May
Cause It—Churchill
May Succeed.

London, Nov. 2.—Lord Minto, it is reported in official circles in London, has arranged to resign the vice-royalty of India early next spring, owing to the condition of the health of his wife, India has never suited the constitution of Lady Minto, who found the sudden change from Canada extremely trying. Even the so-called cool season in India has affected her health injuriously, and her physicians insist in the most urgent manner that this shall be her last winter in India, and that when she comes home in the spring, when the hot weather sets in, it should be for good and all. The wedding of her young daughter, Lady Violet Elliot, to Lord Charles Fitzmaurice, is by the special wish of the King to take place this winter in India, instead of next summer in London, as had been contemplated. It is to be a very gorgeous function, in which full vice-regal state will be displayed, and at which all the leading vassal rulers of India will be represented, either in person or by princes of their houses. Lord and Lady Lansdowne, their son, Lord Kerry, and his lovely wife and their two daughters, the Duchess of Devonshire and the Marchioness of Waterford, with their respective husbands, are all going out to India for the wedding this winter, so that the season at Calcutta promises to prove of altogether exceptional brilliancy.

Of course there is much speculation as to who is to succeed Lord Minto, and among the names which have been mentioned in connection therewith is that of Winston Churchill, who would in that event receive a peerage. There is no doubt that a majority of his colleagues in the cabinet would be willing to pay almost any price to get him out of the way, on account of his forceful manner, his aggressive methods in buying himself about their departments, and likewise because they do not relish the idea of his becoming their master as premier.
