NINTH DIVISION COURT

Cases Heard Yesterday by Judge Macbeth.

Fred Lung, a Celestial, who keeps a laundry on King Street, appeared yesterday in the ninth division court, of which Mr. Frank Whetter is clerk. In an action brought against him by Samuel Harris, of Berlin, The plaintiff claimed that he had sent laundry to the defendant valued at \$4.50. The defendant informed the court that he could not remember receiving such a parcel and he had no entry on his books. Judge Macbeth reserved his decision.

The case of the Metal Shingle and Siding Company of Preston, against William Steinbock, was re-entered for hearing.
