Experiment Begun Four Years Ago Is Now Proven a

LACK OF FORMALITY

Government Agent Holds the Purse Strings for Eight Hundred Children.

London, Jan. 17.—No business de-partment of the state has grown so amazingly or done such useful service as that of the Public Trustee, which was only instituted four years ago, on

The Public Trustee is just what his title infers. He acts, on behalf of the state, as executor and as trustee under a will, or as trustee under a settlement, whether new or old, and in other capacities of a like nature. Nothing is too small or too big for him to look after. As his integrity is guaranteed by the state, as his success has proved his great skill and knowledge, and as he has no and knowledge, and as he has no commercial interests to serve, being solely concerned to do his best for the estates in his trust, it is not surprising that the public shows an inprising that the public shows an in-





REVIVAL OF SNUFF HABIT IN ENGLAND


Automobilists, Unable to Smoke, Take Up the Use of Powdered Tobacco.


