

ATTEMPTED T.R.'S LIFE TO BLOCK THIRD TERM

Assailant of Roosevelt Declares History Has Shown
Them That Third Party Is All Wrong and That
Progressive Success Meant Bloodshed

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 15.—At a late hour this afternoon the police authorities completed the work of transcribing the formal confession of John Schrank, given to Chief of Police Gansett Monday night. The statement, the first authentic detailed account of the assassination given by the assassin, is as follows:

What object did you have in following around and trying to meet Theodore Roosevelt? A.—Because I have been reading history and following history, and I have seen that this man Roosevelt is trying to break one of the old-time established traditions of the country, calling it a third-term, which he has no right to. He can create a third party and create all the offices, but to nominate himself it was absolutely out of the way, and I think today that it is absolutely unnecessary to establish now, and have the term tradition to exist and not be violated by anybody.

Well, what did you have in mind to do when you went around in these different places? A.—I had in mind to meet him, and he escaped me every time; he escaped me in Atlanta and Chattanooga.

He escaped what? A.—He had not come the way I expected; he did not

come out the way I expected; if he goes in a hall today and speaks in a hall, and he comes in this or that way, he goes out a different way, and the man got away.

What did he escape from? A.—From the place I wanted to meet him. Why did you want to meet him? A.—Because I wanted to put him out of the way; a man who wants a third term has no right to live.

You wanted to kill him? A.—I did.

Had a Dream.

Have you any other reason in wanting to kill him? A.—I have.

What is that? A.—I had a dream several years ago. Mr. McKinley appeared to me, and he told me that Mr. Roosevelt is practically his real murderer, and not this here Czolgosz, or whatever his name was; Mr. Roosevelt is practically the man who has been the real murderer of President McKinley in order to get the presidency of the United States, because the way things were at that time he was not supposed to be president; the leaders didn't want him, that's the reason they let him be president, which is what I am sore about to think Mr. McKinley appeared to me in a dream and said: "This is my murderer and nobody else."

SMITH ACQUITT BY
OWN SOUND JURY

No Evidence To Connect Him
With Death of Aged George
Green.

DEAD MAN HAD FITS

Very Often and May Have Sustained
Fatal Injuries By Falling in
One.

Owen Sound, Oct. 15.—After being out for 44 minutes the jury tonight brought in a verdict of not guilty in the case of William Smith, who was charged with the murder of George Green, Mr. Justice Middleton at once discharged the prisoner. The case for the crown was conducted by R. L. White, of Pembroke, while the defence was in the hands of W. H. Wright, of Owen Sound.

On the evening of Thursday, Sept. 12, George Green, an old man, aged 65 years, a Fenian Raid veteran, was found lying unconscious on the floor of the dining-room of his home on Eleventh street east. On his head was a contusion several inches in length. He was removed to the hospital, where death ensued on the Tuesday following, the old man not having regained consciousness.

The Verdict.

A coroner's jury opined that death had been the result of a blow on the head caused by falling, which in turn was caused by a blow on the chin delivered at the hands of some unknown person. Meantime the police arrested William Smith a young man, who had at one time boarded at the Greens', and who was there on the afternoon when Green met his fatal injury. It was known that there had been an altercation between Smith and Green. The trial of Smith opened this morning in the assizes here.

Wife's Evidence.

Mrs. Green, widow of the deceased, who gave her evidence without any outward indication of feeling, said that Smith had come to her home on the afternoon of Sept. 12, and stayed there until the return of her husband, who had been out for a walk. As soon as he entered the house Green had ordered Smith out, but the latter refused, saying he would go when he got ready. However, he went out to the woodshed and was followed by the state Green, who in a minute returned with his face all scratched and bloody, seeing which Mrs. Green went to call the police. She was out about ten minutes before she returned, and when she did come back she was greeted with the sight of her husband lying unconscious on the floor of the dining-room.

Green, she said, had been in very feeble health, and at various times had taken weak fits, when he would fall headlong wherever he happened to be standing.

Several neighbors were called, but could add little to Mrs. Green's story. No one saw Smith or anyone else strike Green, and no one saw Green fall.

STRIKE IN 1905 BEGAN OUTRAGES

Dynamiting Said to Have Originated
in Union's Action Then.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 16.—Records which the Government charges will show that the explosions against employees of non-union workmen, preceding and following the Los Angeles Times disaster, resulted from a strike called upon a bridge construction company in 1905, were identified by witnesses at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial yesterday.

Witnesses identified many letters taken from the files of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, when F. Buchanan, Iowa member of Congress, was president of the union, with headquarters at Cleveland. Mr. Buchanan preceded Frank M. Ryan, now on trial, as president. The Buchanan letters, the Government attorney announced, concerned only the directing of the union's interest in labor disputes, but later the situation was taken up by J. J. McNamara, after Mr. Buchanan retired. None of the letters were read.

The identification included letters written by McNamara to powder companies asking them for catalogues.

JUDGE TESTETZ BETTER.

Toronto, Oct. 15.—Dismissing news which circulated here yesterday in regard to the condition of Mr. Justice Testetz, who recently underwent an operation for ulcerated stomach in a London hospital. It was reported that his heart action was unsatisfactory, and that his condition caused grave anxiety to his friends. Chief Justice Meredith, a close personal friend of the judge, had expected to be in Germany in connection with his competition commission, but he had delayed his departure from London to await the outcome of the crisis. This morning word was received that there has been a change for the better again and that the signs are hopeful.

Chief Justice Meredith, however, is still in London.

BROKE COLLARBONE

St. Thomas Citizen Fell in Front of
Approaching Train.
