

A Waiting List Now. Since the opening of the sanatorium 180 patients have been admitted. Dur-ing the past year, with the ever-increasing demand for beds, there is always a waiting list. To overcome this necessity the London Health Association are formulating plans for an additional story to the present infirmary building. In the special ward for the advanced cases of tuberculosis at Victoria Hospital, provision is made for ten patients, and in the near future a wing now being completed will be opened, giving a total of from 20 to 25 beds, these patients being under the charge and direct supervision of the physician at the Byron Sanator-


