Proctor, who died in New York in 1888, has been brought to a successful conclusion after five years of work, started in 1908. The establishment of a solar physics observatory in New Zealand was assured today by the donation of \$50,000 by Thomas Cawthron, of Nelson, N. Z.

Young Canadian Women Suicides Near Milan

London, May 5.—A Rome dispatch to The Chronicle says a young Canadian woman, Miss Mabel Thompson, daughter of Charles Thompson, said to be a wealthy property-owner, has committed suicide by taking morphine at the Simples Hotel in Milan. No motive is known for the tragedy. Deceased was about 25 years of age. The address of the deceased is not given.

No Public Hearing on Tariff Revision

Washington, May 5.—No public hearings on the tariff revision bill are to be held by the Senate finance committee, according to Senator Simmons, its chairman.

There will be no public hearings, said he today. "That question has been settled."
That determination is expected to speed up consideration of the bill after it gets to the Senate, probably on Thursday, Senator Simmons said today. That those most interested in the schedules were content to file briefs setting forth their views and recommendations.

It is the present view of the finance committee chairman that the committee will have the bill under consideration about ten days or two weeks at most. Following that, two weeks will be given senators to prepare for debate on the floor. The bill is expected to be reached in the Senate about June 1 at the latest.

Republican leaders, it is reported, are planning to move, when the bill comes from the House, to refer it to the finance committee with instructions for public hearings.

BURNED TO DEATH

Pan of Blazing Grease Caught Clothes of Nine-Year-Old Girl.

Ottawa, May 5.—The 9-year-old daughter of Henry Moore, of Earley, Que., about 20 miles from here, was burned to death, and Moore himself was badly burned, when he was probably lighting a pipe in a fire which destroyed their home.

The circumstances of the tragedy were most pathetic. The father was heating a pan of grease and turpentine on the kitchen stove, when it burst into flame. He was rushing out doors with it, when he collided with the girl. The mixture spilled over her clothing, and she was instantly a mass of flames. She dashed into a field and in trying to remove her burning clothing four of her father's fingers were charred. The girl died on Sunday.

BALLOT STUFFING
Sensation at Ottawa Over Charges of Persecution in Election.

Ottawa, May 5.—Another sensation in the local ballot stuffing charges was sprung in police court today, when Omer Chartrand, a civil servant, and E. P. Pacher, a painter, were arrested after leaving the witness box during the preliminary hearing of an action against one of the deputies, Joseph Brany.

The two men will face charges of persecution. They pleaded not guilty to the ballot stuffing charges. The case will be resumed tomorrow.

DOUBLE DROWNING

Fredericton, N. B., May 5.—News of a double drowning in Green River has been received here.
The victims are Charles Cameron, aged 40, of Stanley, N. B., and Albert Pacher, aged 40, of Durham Bridge, N. B. They were working on Randolph & Baker's drive, and lost their lives while crossing the river in a canoe. The craft was caught in a whirlpool.

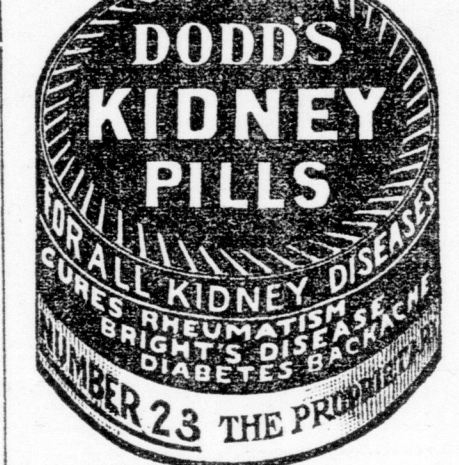
Cyclists Shaken Up By a Collision

DUCHESS BETTER

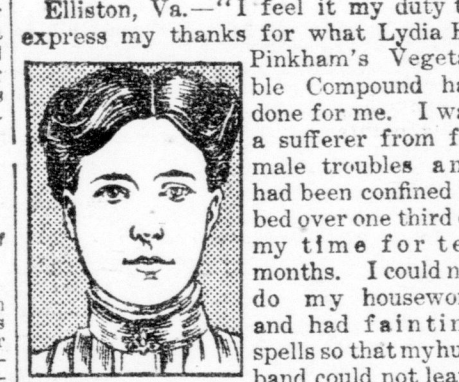
Slowly Regaining Her Strength After Recent Critical Operation.
