And whereas by Section 3 of the Municipal Franchises Act it is provided that the council of a municipality shall not grant to any company, nor shall any company acquire the right to use or occupy any of the highways of the municipality to supply to the corporation or to the inhabitants of the municipality, or to any of them, gas, including natural gas, electric light, heat or power or steam, unless or until a bylaw setting forth the terms and conditions upon which, and the period for which, such right is to be granted, has been assented to by the municipal electors as provided by the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903, with respect to bylaws requiring the assent of the electors.

And whereas it is expedient to grant
