As a result of the deputation which waited on the Westminster Council at its inaugural meeting in the County Buildings to request some steps toward the alleviation of unemployment in Manor Park, the council Thursday afternoon met in the County Buildings, where the situation was discussed.

That the council will work in conjunction with the county engineer, and the suburban road commission, to help alleviate unemployment in the county was the decision reached.

The members decided to gravel some of the roads, and build a number of culverts in Manor Park. The work of graveling roads will probably be started immediately.

Robert Brown, who was appointed relief inspector at the council's inaugural meeting announced Thursday that he would accept the appointment. Mr. Brown will look after all relief work.

Mr. Haystead was appointed supervisor of local dispatch, succeeding Neil McNeil, who had been superannuated, and was to have assumed his new duties on Feb. 1. He has been employed at the London postoffice for the past forty years.

Y.W.C.A. GIRLS' CLUBS DISCUSS HOME TOPICS

Debate Questions Relative to Standards for Wives and Husbands.

INTERESTS IN COMMON

Normal Student Urges Ideal of Drummond's "Love Spectrum" Analysis.

"What is real love?" "What part should mentality play as a determining factor with regard to marriage?"

"Should a girl marry a man without knowing that he is able to earn enough to support her?" "Does a man really love a girl if he will marry her without being sure that he can support a home?" "Is a couple justified in getting married without a reserve fund to tide them over in case of sickness, unemployment or other emergency?"

Standard for Home. The foregoing were among the questions earnestly discussed Thursday evening by the Federation of Girls' Clubs of the Y. W. C. A., with a view to making their standard for the home for the husband and for the wife, which they have been considering for several months past as complete as possible before putting it into printed form.

According to the Industrial Extension Secretary, Mrs. Mattie Rose Crawford, leader of the Federation of Girls' Clubs, the study of these subjects, and the putting of conclusions into the concrete form of standards, has been undertaken in the most serious spirit as a guide for the girls and to prevent them from making shipwreck of their lives on rocks of matrimony.

"Nothing could be more important," she declared in the course of discussion.

Thursday evening they had the benefit of the girl students' point of view as submitted by four Normal School girls, Miss Edna Kennedy, Essex; Miss Minnie Myers, Woodville; Miss Mary Bondy, Essex, and Miss Clara Riggs, Windsor.

Up to Thursday's meeting the standards had stood as follows:

For the Husband.

Must be moral, desirable that he should be a Christian, preferably of the same denomination as the girl.

In the second place he should be healthy, free from tuberculosis, able to measure up to the standards of social purity.

Thirdly, he should be able to support a home in a simple way, and, advisedly, he should have a profession or trade.

In the fourth place there should be compatibility and community of interests.

Standard for the Wife.

The same in the first two and fourth requirements as for the husband.

In the third place she should be able to keep house, manage her home efficiently, to use to the best advantage the income at her disposal.

The standard for the home emphasized the point that it should be built on a foundation of true love.

Normal Students Speak.

Miss Kennedy, the first student speaker took up the subject of love as the foundation of the home, giving as the ideal the analysis of Dr. Henry Drummond, the "Love Spectrum," which resolves love into the component parts, patience, kindness, generosity, humility, courtesy, unselfishness, good temper, guilelessness and sincerity.

"If the man you think you love does not inspire these feelings in you," she said, "then take warning. You are on dangerous ground."

Dealing with the question of mentality with relation to standards for choosing a husband or wife, Miss Myers, through the discussion which followed her short paper, had the honor of suggesting two points to be added to the federation standards. The first is, that there should be every assurance that both parties are normal, mentally before marriage is contracted. The second, in the interests of posterity that close relations should not marry.

Miss Mary Bondy dealt with the responsibility of the husband and wife towards the community, and they have established their home. Their responsibility involved, in her opinion, support of the church, hospitality to neighbors and strangers, helping along efforts in the line of community betterment, down to the standard of the Federation of Girls' Clubs goes the additional standard for the home, "making the home a centre of blessing."

Discusses Family Budget.

Miss Riggs gave a practical little talk on the family budget, provocative of animated discussion.

A budget, she maintained, would make a husband and wife feel equally the responsibility of financing the home, from the earning side on the one hand, the spending on the other.

What caused hardship in so many homes when a few weeks' unemployment came along? Lack of foresight in saving up for a rainy day.

The budget system would promote co-operation between husband and wife in building up a savings account, she held.

Of first importance was the budget for food, essential to life. A new dress could be waited for rather than run a charge account to result in possible embarrassment later.

She deplored the habit of "charge accounts," referring to her knowledge of girls even running charge accounts for their Christmas presents. "If they do this now, what will they do later when they have homes of their own?" was a point she raised.

Children's Allowances.

She expressed herself in favor of allowances for children, however small, to teach them from their earliest years the value of money and responsibility with regard to spending it wisely.

Thrifty would have a prominent place in her standards for husband, wife and the home.

"What is a reasonable income on which a couple may marry?" was a question raised as a result of Miss Riggs' talk.

"Depends upon the couple," came the voice of a wise and winsome young industrial worker. "Some couples could save a satisfactory amount on an income that wouldn't begin to keep an other couple."

And so it was decided not to name an arbitrary amount as necessary before getting married, but to give prominence to thrift in the Y. W. C. A. Federation of Girls' Club Standards.

Miss Elsie Chambers presided in the absence of the federation president.

Committee of Teachers To Draft Course of Bible Studies

ON Saturday morning a special committee of the London Teachers' Institute will meet to draft a proposed course of Scripture reading for the public schools of the city. The board of education has already approved of Bible instruction as a part of the school procedure, and it is set as the date for the introduction of the same.

There are citizens, however, who have made inquiries as to this proposed course, and from information obtained from the local department, it is said that no child whose parent or guardian takes exception to the same, can be compelled to participate in the study.

The regulations state expressly that parents or guardians must give due notice to the child's teacher, personally or by written communication, following which the child shall be allowed to withdraw during the exercise.

TRAVELERS' AID NAMES SECRETARY

While two secretaries have been the largest number engaged so far to carry on the strenuous work, in the opinion of those who understand the responsibilities involved, three are really necessary.

Figures submitted at the meeting for the year give an idea of the great amount of work compassed. The secretaries helped 4,067 travelers. Of this number, 3,717 were women and girls, and 350 boys and men. They directed 236 to the Y. W. C. A., and 181 to hotels. The number of letters sent was 137.

USE CARS FITTED WITH WIRELESS

Paris, Jan. 13.—The Paris police are using wireless-equipped automobiles to rid the city of bandits and highwaymen, and are ready to use airplanes in times of riots or demonstrations. Several automobiles have been fully equipped with the wireless apparatus, and the police can cruise about the city and call for help from headquarters by wireless if they find themselves in a desperate situation.

They plan to use airplanes primarily for the study of traffic problems, but also, when needed, to cope with rioters.

\$800,000 DEFICIT IN CHICAGO OPERA

Chicago, Jan. 13.—The high cost of producing grand opera will result in a deficit of more than \$800,000 in the financial affairs of the Chicago Grand Opera Company this season, it was estimated last night by members of the newly-formed association which will handle the company's business next season.

This deficit, said to be the largest ever contracted by any opera company in a single season, will be met by Harold McCormick and Edith Rockefeller McCormick, recently divorced from him. The McCormicks agreed five years ago to cover the annual deficit until May, 1922, but Mr. McCormick has announced that after that time he no longer will be responsible for the losses.

DECLARES ANCIENT EQUAL OF MODERN

Dean Fox Delivers Address On Modernity of Antiquity.

"The modernity of antiquity" was the subject of the lecture given by Dean Sherwood Fox of the arts faculty of Western University at the public library Thursday night.

In introducing his subject, the speaker declared that there was a tendency prevalent today to live as though there never had been a past, that everything we had now was taken for granted as being the result of the present day achievements instead of being lessons from the past.

Dean Fox traced, through the ages, the beginning of science, stating that as long ago as 600 B.C. an eclipse of the sun was predicted with accuracy, and that in the fifth century astronomy was the guiding thought of the time.

To the ancient Greeks we are indebted for our knowledge of geometry, it being only in quite recent years that the books of Euclid had been revised. In the year 300 B.C. Euclid gave to the world his books of geometry, and they have been used in their original form practically ever since.

Extracts were read from translations, showing that the science of medicine was known to the Greeks and practiced at the Temple of Healing. Several translations of Greek drama were read which compared very favorably with the up-to-date drama now played. The plots and settings, as explained, were all very similar to what we see today in a modern play. Some Greek comedy was produced and created a great deal of amusement by the manner in which it was read.
