CONCERT EIGHT CHARM PATRONS AT GRAND OPERA

Great Musical Festival Rendered by English Musicians Last Night.

NEW PROGRAM TODAY

London's Great Concert Eight of England enshrined themselves in the heart of music-loving little London at the Grand Theatre last night. No finer music festival had been heard here before, and the audience basked in the splendor of one of the best concert programs for nearly three hours. Although the audience was small, the reception accorded this all-star aggregation of musicians was spontaneous and sincere, and represented as whole-hearted a tribute to musical excellence as could be given. Opening with an original composition by Tom Copeland, the eminent concert comedian, called "Hail, Glorious Canada," the numbers, both instrumental and vocal, kept everyone at wrapt attention, so variegated and gorgeous was the program. Unlike many lesser attempts at presenting a musical feast, the London Concert Eight achieve an extraordinary effect by interpolating the performance with humor. To Tom Copeland and Suzette Tarri, two delightful masters of mimicry, the comedy honors were awarded without cavil. Both are versatile, eminently attractive personalities, and their sprightly songs will tinkle in the ears of those who heard them for many days.

Miss Joan Duff, a 16-year-old girl prodigy, displayed rare technique on the piano, and in her Chromatic waltz she brought the audience literally to their feet. Sceldom has appreciation of musical artists been so marked. Each in his or her turn were accorded long ovations, and every one was much deserved. It is difficult to pick and choose from a program of such excellence, but to many Walter Nunn's work on the cello playing "Trantello" gave supreme satisfaction. Miss Molly O'Moore, singing "Orchard by the Sea," was also one of the stellar lights in an assembly of perfectly-trained and exceptionally-talented artists. Her mellow soprano notes poured through the house with all the ecstatic abandon of a nightingale set free, and thrilled the audience. Richard Alexander in the "Whoo-tapper's Song" was an all-too-brief treat, while the final number, act five from "Faust," featuring Miss O'Moore, Mr. Virgo, Mr. Alexander, with the remaining members of the concert company comprising the chorus, gave a wonderful finish to what was unquestionably the finest musical treat London has seen in years.

Responding to cries for "encore" at the end of the program, Mr. Tom Copeland made an acceptable little address, which he spoke with the gratifying reception his company had enjoyed since coming to Canada. The fact that the audience was small be attributed to the conflict of names, which made many citizens think the concert was a local affair. Today an entirely new program will be given, and on Saturday, matinee and evening, the famous English musicians will again charm Londoners with their marvelous playing and singing.

HANDSHAKING BAN TO SAVE COOLIDGE

President Will Not Be Required To Give Right Arm Pumping.

Washington, April 24.—The White House handshaking ban, for the present at least, is going to save President Coolidge an average of 250 pumps of his right arm a day. That is a conservative estimate drawn by White House attaches who watch the receiving line around the noon hour. Already during the Easter holidays these attaches say it has saved that amount of handshaking. As for the physical fatigue they say it has saved a whole lot more energy than can be estimated in figures.

Smaller groups of visitors, it is pointed out, will continue to receive the usual hand clasp and spoken greeting. But the president will be spared long period of handshaking with big delegations and groups.

PROTEST MADE AGAINST REDUCTIONS IN TARIFF

Manufacturers of Ontario Adopt Motion At Annual Meeting.

Toronto, April 24.—A protest against the tariff reductions announced in the last federal budget was voiced by the manufacturers of Ontario in the form of a motion, which was unanimously adopted, at today's joint annual meeting of the Ontario division and the Toronto branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association here. The motion was moved by Elmer Davis of Kingston and seconded by ex-Mayor G. C. Coppley of Hamilton. The retiring chairman of the Ontario division, George Bridden, reviewed the tariff situation, and declared that the reductions had brought hard times, which would prevail until remedial measures were adopted. The report of the executive committee dealt with the power situation, reviewing the Morrisburg proposals and the St. Lawrence waterways plan. The committee, it was stated, had urged the government to expedite the negotiations and investigations respecting the St. Lawrence project.

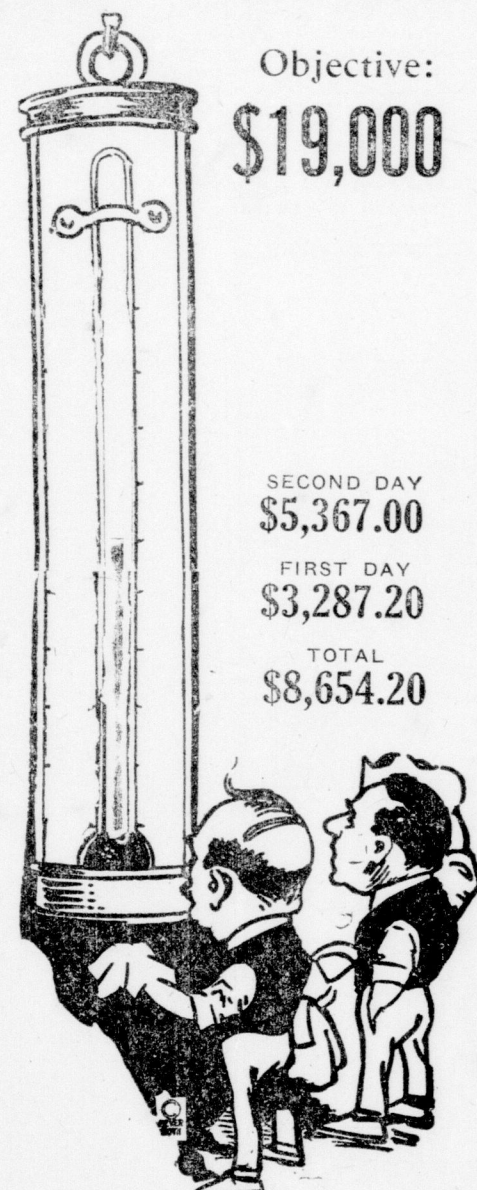
