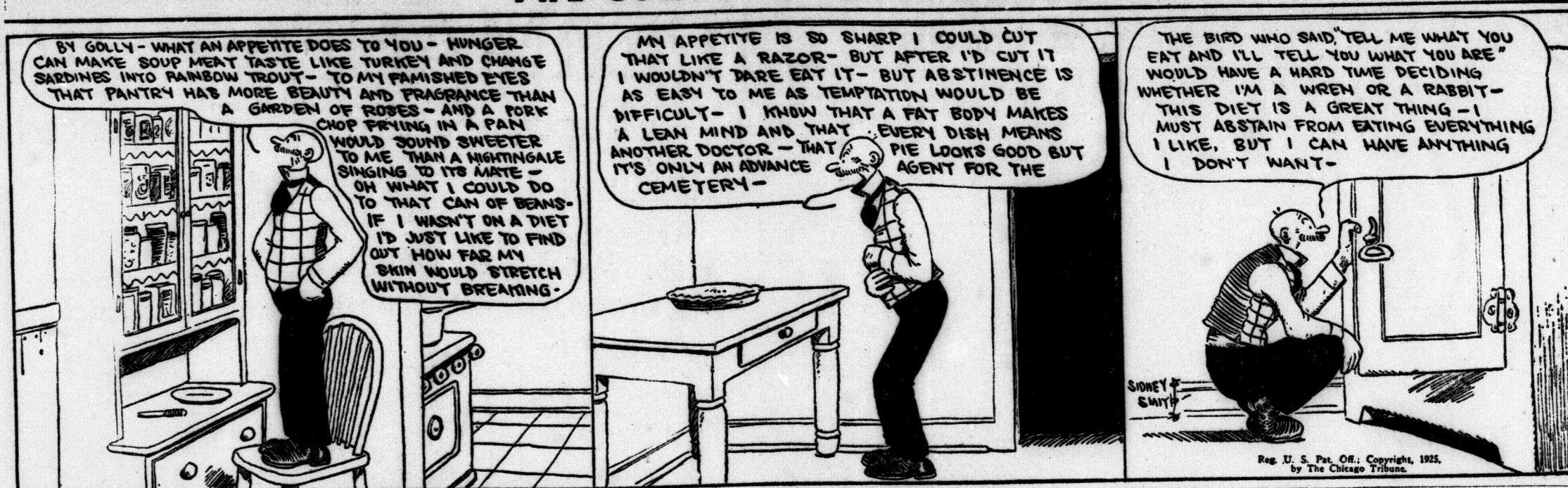

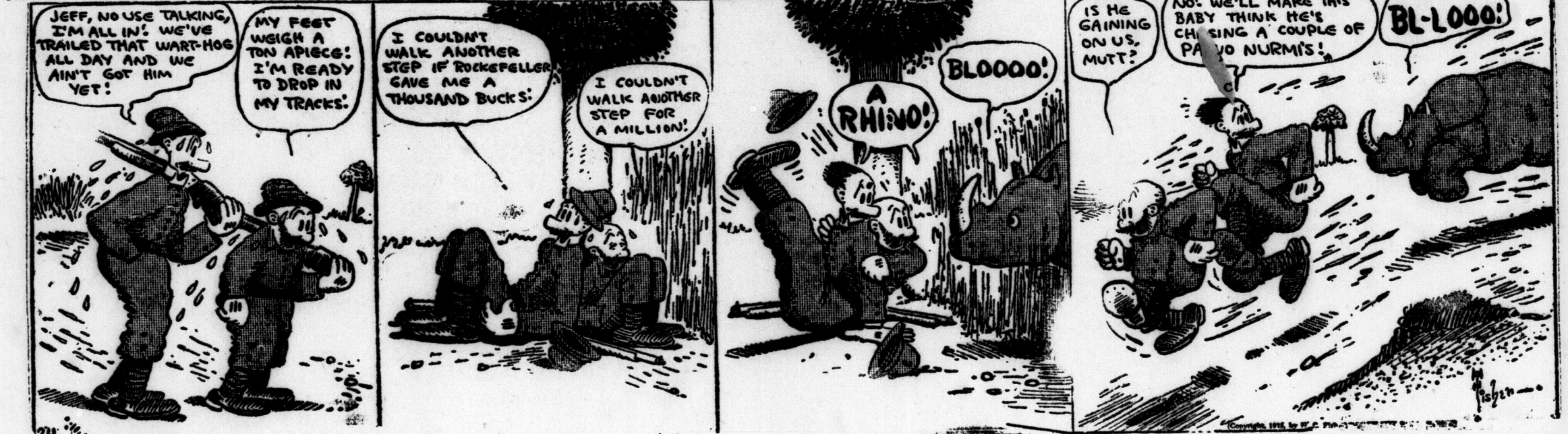

## RUM TRADE PROBE BEGINS AS RESULT OF ERIE TRAGEDY

Inquest at Port May Lead To Wide Investigation.

**BACKED BY PUBLIC**  
Question Issuing of Clearance Papers To Unseaworthy Craft.

St. Thomas, April 27.—Initial steps in the probe of the liquor export traffic, which has been deemed advisable as a result of the Lake Erie drowning tragedy of last week, were taken by crown attorneys this afternoon in opening an inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Bert Butcher, owner of the ill-fated Valkyrie, otherwise known as the Ada May Belle.

While the inquest is ostensibly for the purpose of determining the causes of the death of the late Mr. Butcher, its chief end, it is understood, will be the laying bare of all the devious intricacies of the liquor traffic of the port. With this as the ultimate objective, no inquest will be held into the death of the other three victims. Public opinion in the village is strongly behind the authorities, and

is demanding a thorough investigation of a traffic which they believe to have illicit aspects and which has resulted directly or indirectly in one of the most pathetic tragedies of recent years.

The export of liquor, it is pointed out, is not illegal under dominion enactment but by the terms of the Volstead act, liquor cannot be imported into the states, thus a trans-lake traffic in spirits means bootlegging on the American side. It is the intention of the crown to inquire into the issuing of clearance papers for her was cognizant of the fact. In addition to this the issuing of clearance papers to unseaworthy craft is to be probed, according to Crown Attorney McCormick.

The coroner's jury is composed of Charles Lanning, foreman, J. H. Burke, A. Clarke, W. Eastwick, Charles Findlay, Geo. Smith, H. A. Short, John Oliver and A. McDonald. At the request of the crown an adjournment of a week was granted, and the jury will meet again at Port Stanley Tuesday evening, May 5, at 8 p.m. A recent amendment to the inquest act makes it possible for the jury to eliminate the viewing of the remains, and with the consent of the crown the jury adjourned without this formality.

## EARL OF BALFOUR TO LEAD COUNCIL

Joins British Cabinet—Salisbury Heads House of Lords.

London, April 27.—The Earl of Balfour today joined the British cabinet, being appointed lord president of the council in succession to Marquis Curzon, who died recently. He will not, however, become government leader in the House of Lords, the post held by Lord Curzon. That duty will fall upon the Marquis of Salisbury, who is a much younger man. Lord Salisbury is 64 years old and Lord Balfour 77.
