HONOR FOR CAMPBELLTON BOY

Billy Mott Awarded Military Medal for Bravery Under Fire.

Word has been received here that Despatch Rider W. G. (Billy) Mott, son of Mrs. Geo. G. McKenzie, has been awarded the Military Medal for pluck and bravery in bringing in a dead and a wounded comrade while under shell fire, and while himself being wounded.

Despatch Rider Mott was proceeding along a road in a car with two companions. The road was suddenly shelled by the enemy and a shell struck near the car, killing the driver and wounding both the occupants. Mott was wounded in the right arm and left leg, but pluckily took charge of the car and drove it eight miles over a very rough road, and under shell fire for a part of the way, bringing it and its load safely to headquarters, although he was in a very exhausted condition.

Dalhousie, Jan. 16.—The first gun in connection with a provincial election whether it comes before or after a Session of the Legislature, will no doubt be fired in Restigouche County if one can judge by a statement which appeared in a Moncton paper recently. "The Evening Standard" of Jan. 2nd, published news item written by a Montreal correspondent, in which the following paragraph appeared: "Hon. C. H. The score was: Bathurst 19 Wran 14, McKay 11 Shives 14, 80 28.

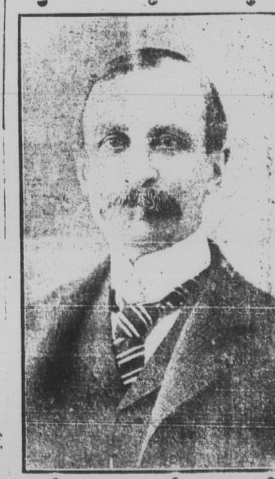
DIED OVERSEAS.

MOTION PICTURE OF V. A. D. WORK

Col. R. J. Birdwhistle Will Show Pictures and Lecture Here.

Col. R. J. Birdwhistle, secretary of the committee of the St. John Ambulance Association for the Dominion, presented before a large audience in the Imperial theatre, St. John Monday afternoon a wonderful series of moving pictures showing the efficiency, resourcefulness and usefulness of the association in the relief of suffering and the prevention of serious results from slight accidents. The public had been invited to attend the pictorial demonstration as an education and in order that a full realization of the benefits of the association work might be obtained. Everyone who saw the pictures was deeply impressed with the good which has been accomplished and the need of further extending the work.

By way of introduction to the pictures which needed no explanation, Colonel Birdwhistle told of the origin of the association as an order to care for the sick at the time of the Crusades, the name being then the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. At the time of the Franco-Prussian war the order realizing the need of training in the care of the sick in times of peace in order that full preparation for war emergencies might be made, the teaching of simple and common-sense methods of dealing with emergencies and accidents was taught by the St. John Ambulance Association and its regular scheme of work was outlined. The scheme includes first aid, hygiene, the manufacture of supplies for ambulance work and the organization of ambulance corps and the general promotion of works which in peace or war tend to the relief of suffering.

MEANS HEAVY LOSS TO CITIZENS

Poor Railway Service Drives Trade Away From Campbellton.

A meeting of the Retail Merchants Association was held in the Council Chambers Tuesday evening at which the matter of railway passenger service in and out of Campbellton was the chief subject under consideration.

President Geo. G. McKenzie occupied the chair and H. B. Anslow was appointed secretary pro tem.

The matter of approaching the C.N.R. management in reference to improvement in the railway service was discussed at length and it was decided to appoint a committee of three to act with committees from other towns on Council and Board of Trade.

Messrs. Geo. G. McKenzie, F. E. Shephard and M. P. Moore were appointed such a committee.

Various railway matters were discussed, including the proposed subway at Central Street.

The meeting then adjourned.

Its kindred association the Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association had confined itself chiefly to educational work and had instructed 20,000 troops and trained 250 women whose services had helped in no small degree to lessen the illness and suffering in the war. He went on to describe the organization of the association in Canada in 1911 and speaking of the New Brunswick branch of which Miss Lillian Hazen is the secretary, said that it was hoped that a definite centre for the association would soon be formed in St. John.

MANY CANADIANS ON TRANSPORT

Transport Protestants In Distress is Repeated Proceeding to Destination.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—The British troopship Proteus, which was reported in distress owing to a broken propeller is safe and proceeding to Vladivostok under her own steam. Word to this effect has been received by both the Militia and Naval Departments here.

The Navy Department cable came from the naval transport officer at Vladivostok, and states that the Proteus, with Canadian troops for Siberia on board is safe, and steaming to Vladivostok.

The Militia Department advice was sent by General Elmsley, commanding the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force, now at Vladivostok, who states that the Proteus reported by wireless: "No assistance required."

The vessel has over two thousand Canadian soldiers on board from all parts of the Dominion. General Pinkford, commanding the Canadian Infantry Division in Siberia, is believed to be a passenger.

BITTER FIGHT FOR MAYORSHIP
