### FUNERAL OF MR. ARCH'D DUNCAN

The funeral of the late Mr. Archibald Duncan, who died on Tuesday at the residence of his nephew, Mr. W. D. Duncan, was held on Thursday afternoon, before a large attendance. Revs. T. P. Drumm, B.D. and C. A. Hardy conducted the services. The pall bearers were Messrs. W. F. Ferguson, R. B. Gernard, Thomas Duncan, Murray Duncan, Alex. Ferguson and A. F. Chamberlain.

Archibald Duncan was born in Campbellton in 1837 and moved to Tide Head with his family, where on the death of his father, he, assisted by his brother Alexander, carried on farming on a large scale on the homestead. For some years back he had, on account of failing health, resided with his nephew, Mr. W. D. Duncan, from whose residence the body was borne to the grave.

### NEW ENGINE HAULING INCREASED TONNAGE NORTH

The new locomotive which was built for the Intercolonial by the Canadian Locomotive Works, Toronto, and which was recently put into commission on this part of the road, has already completed two round trips over the northern division—Campbellton and return. So far as could be learned, the new machine is every satisfaction, both to the traffic department and the engineers. It is worthy of note that the engine is able to haul a much greater tonnage than the engines of a similar type already in use. Whereas the old or consolidation engines were only classed to haul 850 tons, and the new Kingston consolidations 1,000 tons, the new engine is able to handle 1200 tons easily over the stiff grades between Moncton and Campbellton. When the remaining four engines of this class arrive, they should do much to relieve the congestion of traffic along the line. It is too bad that they can not at present be used on the eastern division, since that part of the road has been literally choked with freight for the past few weeks. It is feared, however, that the weight of the engine is too great for some of the bridges.

### WELL KNOWN HERE

The first anniversary of the Vancouver Sun, February 12, was marked by the publication of a 48-page paper. Sixteen pages were devoted to sketches and pictures of prominent Liberals, many of whom are natives of this province. Among these we notice the name of Chas. Reid, who is well known in this territory.

### CHARLES REID

"Six years' hard schooling in a general store, three years as representative of agricultural machinery manufacturers for Bonaventure county, Quebec, eighteen months hard going over the memorable trail from Edmonton into the 'Klondike' with the rush of '68,' and nine years of the mining game along the creeks of the north," forms but a part of the interesting career of the subject of this sketch, Charles Reid. Born in Newcastle (N.B.), in 1873, the son of Charles Reid, a well known native of that region and old-time lumber dealer, he received his primary education in the public schools of the town and later at Harkin's Academy, graduating 1889. After spending some years in the Yukon he came to Vancouver in 1907, and is now engaged in the real estate business. Since coming to Vancouver he had been active in the causes of good Liberalism. He married Miss Mary B. Sutherland, daughter of Rev. J. M. Sutherland, Bonaventure county (Que.) in Dawson, 1900.
