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OPTIMISM OF C. N. R. CHIEFS IS WELL FOUNDED ON STEADY PROGRESS THAT IS BEING MADE

Canadian National Lines Are Getting The Business In A Big Way—New Interest Being Shown By People of Dominion In The System As A National Enterprise—A Few Reasons.

From time to time the general public is informed, through the medium of the press, of the optimism of the officials of Canadian National Railways regarding the future of this great, modern transportation system. At banquets this optimism is constantly bubbling over, reports of railway business conferences indubitably reflect it when ambitious reporters secure interviews with Sir Henry Thornton this same spirit is predominant in any declaration he may make. Perhaps the average reader, made unduly skeptical by the uncertainty of present day conditions, does not stop to consider the source of these optimistic observations nor seek any reason for their announcement, but although that may be true, there are a great many citizens everywhere who are interested and rightly so, in the Canadian National Railways as a possession which is, in the last analysis, part and parcel of Canada's resources. And to them the question frequently recurs: Is this optimism securely founded? Does the progress that is being made really warrant such optimism regarding the future? The purpose of this article is to answer these questions and to state, briefly, a few supporting facts. A Few Reasons
