Germany warned to prepare for the inevitable.

Belgrade, June 15.—The statement that M. Periani, the Russian Minister at Belgrade, had proposed a Russo-Serbian convention caused uneasiness here. The receipt of semi-official telegrams from Belgrade to night declaring the story unfounded has tended to restore confidence. Events in the Balkans do not mature as rapidly as it was feared they would. That alarm is felt is evidenced by the refusal of official press at Belgrade to publish the story. The North German Gazette pointedly referred to the proposed operation as illegal, and even the Liberal Vossische Zeitung warned German investors to unload Russian stock as speedily as possible in anticipation of the inevitable life and death struggle between Russia and Germany. The committee of the Bourse is expected to deliver an opinion tomorrow on the legality of the proposed convention, but it is felt that the Government would not have exposed German capital to heavy losses except in the most direst of dangers, and that had Balkan affairs been peaceful nothing would have been heard of the illegality of the convention.

The Serbian Government has refused to renew the commercial treaty with Austria-Hungary, which expires in 1910. Every-thing indicates that the Russian party in Belgrade, confident of its ascendancy, is working to effect some definite aim, and that its scheme can only end in precipitating a war or in a possible partition of the Balkan states between Austria and Russia.

The Serbian Situation.

London, June 15.—In speaking of the Serbian news published to-day, an attaché of the Foreign Office who has just returned from Belgrade says: "Affairs in Serbia are in a very excited and uneasy condition at the present moment, and the Government will be fortunate if they have nothing more serious than an occasional riot to deal with. The Serbians are governed by a boy king who is 12 years old and a Regency composed of M. Ristich and two generals of somewhat doubtful reputation. M. Ristich is the only Serbian politician of any reputation, and is no doubt a very able man. He wants Serbia to follow an independent line, and to be the heron among the turkeys of the Balkans. The report that he is consulting with Russia and other powers on such other like matters is largely manufactured in Vienna, where one and all the correspondents appear to be in the pocket of the Austrian Foreign Office, and we all know by this time what those attacks on M. Ristich really mean. Ristich's great authority will undoubtedly be used to keep Serbia in safe and prudent waters. The fall of the other two regents is extremely likely to be one of the events of the near future, but it will not drag him down also."

The Samoa Conference.

London, June 15.—"There can be no doubt," says the Berlin correspondent of The Times this morning, "that the Americans have emerged from the Samoa Conference with flying colors, and that Germany has had to content herself with a prospect of less political predominance on the islands than she claimed at Washington by years ago. This result, it would appear, is much more due to the firm and inexorable attitude of Mr. Blaine than to any political leaning of England toward the United States. Every Thing Ahead in Edinburgh.

London, June 15.—There is every prospect of lively times in Edinburgh. Mr. Parnell, against the opinion of some of his best friends, has accepted the freedom of the city, voted by the Town Council, in spite of what is known to be a powerful and influential opposition in the city itself.
