The men have been out of work for over two months and hundreds of those who have families have sold or pawned everything of value they possessed in order to obtain food for their wives and children. It is a common occurrence for the London and provincial papers to report deaths of miners, little children who have died from actual starvation. Relief committees have been appointed to alleviate as far as possible the prevailing distress. Parts of the work of these committees is the feeding of children. Thousands of women apply daily for the only food it is possible for them to obtain. With this condition of affairs prevailing the mayors think they may be able to bring some understanding between the masters and men that will furnish mills, factories, etc., with a plentiful supply of fuel. Should the coal famine continue and the industries of the several towns be forced to suspend the uffering among the operatives and artisans and their families would be great.
