

# Australians Meet U.S. Tennis Team To-Day; Alerts Go To Guelph To-Morrow

## Tilden Does Not Take Australians Seriously

Figures U. S. Tennis Team Should Defend Davis Cup In Series Which Open To-Day

NEW YORK, August 30.—The challenge round of the team lawn tennis championship of the world for the Davis cup opens to-morrow at the New Stadium at Forest Hills, Long Island, when J. O. Anderson, of Australia, plays Little Bill Johnston, of America. This will be followed by a meeting of J. B. Hawkes, of Australia, and myself.

Conditions point to great tennis. The weather, which early in the week looked bad, with rain falling at frequent intervals, which have been very slow and soft, should be in excellent condition when play is called. The grass is in magnificent condition, the grass is full and thick, the field well-drained and covered. The seat sale has been large and interest is running high, so that every indication points to a successful capacity gallery for the opening match.

One might also say that the first match settles the tie, at least so far as Australia's chances go. Their whole hope rests on Anderson, who cannot give Johnston or me a shade too fast for the brilliant young Australian to cope with. On the other hand Anderson is a play er who in his play may defeat anyone. No one realizes the fact better than do Johnston and I.

The Antipodean captain is primed for the fight of his life, and he knows that the only hope of a successful termination of the match for Australia rests on his winning both his single matches. The Australians look very good in the doubles. Haines and Anderson proved their class when they defeated Johnston and Griffin in the United States doubles championship last week at Boston. The American team has not yet been announced, although I expect to see Williams and myself selected for the match. I believe I should defeat Johnston, but I realize that he is a very dangerous opponent at all times and that cannot afford to run the risk of overconfidence.

Captain Williams has only won one just hard enough to have all keen and eager. We are underestimating rather than overestimating, which speaks for the American leadership. Nothing is so dangerous as to be a chameleon, and I believe I should defeat Johnston, but I realize that he is a very dangerous opponent at all times and that cannot afford to run the risk of overconfidence.

If I were to run up the worst of the match I would say that Anderson is quite capable of winning one of his singles (probably the one he will win, but not both, and that Australia might win the doubles. I am not allowing these I cannot give Johnston a victory, so I am confident that America will again successfully defend the Davis cup. It is my strong opinion that we should do better than 2-2, for you can never tell when we might go crazy and really clean up. The stadium, primed and ready, comes in every way worthy of the great event which it will witness. The great semi-circle of concrete should become the home in the future of a tradition of American tennis that will make it a worthy competitor of Wimbledon. I only hope that the tennis played in the Davis cup will be a worthy companion to the match our English friends, Miss McKane, Mrs. Beamish, Mrs. Covell and Mrs. Clayton, together with our own heroines, Miss Helen Wills, Mrs. Franklin J. Mallory, Miss Eleanor Galt and Mrs. Galt, and Wightman, played at its dedication. Certainly such stars as these find fitting companions in J. O. Anderson, J. B. Hawkes and our own "Little Bill" Johnston and "Dick Williams."


